TORONTO, Dec. 22—In the nutrition field and in the campaign to abolish diphtheria, public health measures known in the past as being used for the improvement of public health in Great Britain, it was disclosed today in a bulletin of the Health League of Canada, that the British Ministry of Health has asked Dr. Gordon P. Jackson, from S. P. Wilkinson, director of public relations for the British Ministry of Health.

"How Toronto beat diphtheria" is the heading on large posters displayed prominently in hundreds of British towns and cities. The poster says: "We can do likewise. It is up to you to show how in 1929 Toronto had 1022 cases of diphtheria and 64 deaths, and how, after a campaign for immunization began, the cases dropped to 56 in 1934, with five deaths, and in 1940 there were no cases, and of course no deaths."

The British Ministry of Health has asked Dr. Jackson to send them full details of how Toronto co-operated with voluntary organizations such as the Health League of Canada, how clinics were set up, and how parents were persuaded that they should have their children protected against diphtheria.

Many other cities in Canada have had a "No diphtheria" record during the past year, Health League officials said. In some centres of Canada the disease still takes its toll. Diphtheria could be completely wiped out of Canada, if proper health educational methods were adopted and parents had their children vaccinated.

Visit to Canada of Sir Wilson Jamieson, chief medical officer of the British Ministry of Health, resulted in his adopting a new diet for expectant mothers in Great Britain. The diet evolved after extensive surveys of expectant mothers in Toronto, and careful tests had been made, has proven, according to medical authorities, that proper food can reduce the infant and maternal mortality rate.

Canadian Merchant Navy seamen who brave submarines surface raiders and aircraft in order to transport troops and war supplies overseas, will now be entitled to wear the badge pictured above. The insignia draws attention to the fact that these men of the merchant fleet are virtually part of Canada's fighting force. The government Order in Council authorizing issue of the badge states that it is to be worn by the personnel of ships of Canadian registry "When on shore leave in civilian attire, in order that recognition may be accorded to the national importance of their contribution to the sea transport of troops, munitions and supplies, and the carriage of exports to overseas markets."

Canada's Forest Resources

Canada's total forested area exceeds 1,220,000 square miles and occupies 35 per cent of the land area of the Dominion, according to low estimates of the forest resources recently compiled by the Dominion Forest Service, Department of Mines and Resources. These estimates have been compiled from information provided by provinces which have made inventories of their forest resources and from surveys conducted by the Dominion in other areas.

About 450,000 square miles of this forest is not suitable for commercial operations, but on 770,000 square miles the trees are large enough for use now often be expected to grow to usable size in future. Because of Canada's great size, and the concentration of her population in the eastern part of the country, large areas of forests of commercial value are at present too far removed from centres of consumption to be economically operated. The presently accessible portion of the productive forest totals about 430,000 square miles, of which about 45 per cent bears merchantable timber and 55 per cent is occupied by young growth.

The volume of wood in the merchantable forest is estimated at 312,140 million cubic feet. About two-thirds of this volume, consisting of 252,160 million feet board measure, of sawlogs and 1,500 million cords of small material, is now accessible. Most important of all species is spruce, which constitutes more than one-third of the total forest. Softwood or coniferous species together make up 75 per cent of the total stand, and hardwood or broadleaved species, 25 per cent.

Complete information respecting rate of use and wastage in Canada's forests under war conditions is not yet available, but it is known that about 70 per cent of the total depletion is due to utilization and 30 per cent to loss from fire, insects, and other causes.

Plan to make Battle Dress More attractive

OTTAWA, Dec. 22—(CP)—An improved form of battle dress for the Canadian soldier, with a revised design and better-quality khaki cloth, is understood to be under examination by army officials although no final approval has been given.

Some smartening of the design of the soldier's "working uniform" has been advocated because the uniforms of other branches of the fighting services were considered more attractive. It was learned. One anticipated step was that the tunic design would be improved.

Japan Isolated With Her Enemy All Around Her

The Japanese Empire in declaring war upon the British Empire and the United States has aligned herself as an ally of Germany and Italy against a group of peoples whose combined populations aggregate a figure in excess of 1,200,000,000.

The total population of the Islands of Japan according to a 1938 census was 72,222,600. The populations of the countries with which she now is at war are: British Empire, 500,000,000; China, 400,000,000; United States, 150,000,000; Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, 180,000,000, making a total of 1,230,000,000.

Japan's No. 1 ally in her war against the democratic nations is Germany whose total population in 1938 was 65,000,000 but has risen to about 103,000,000 by virtue of the present war. The population of Fascist Italy is 42,000,000.

Thus a combination of 1,230,000,000 people is at war with three nations whose combined populace is only 217,000,000. This figure includes 40,000,000 citizens who are only under German rule today because their countries have been invaded and occupied.

land as well as other British possessions in the Far East have long apprehended Japan's entry into the war and have been preparing for it on an intensive scale. Hence the secret but hurried departure some weeks ago of Canadian troops now in Hong Kong and at other points in the Far East.

The western coast of Canada including Vancouver Island is strongly garrisoned and, of course, powerful units of the British Navy are located everywhere in the broad Pacific.

Insuring upon Japan's position created by her entry into the war is important to recognize that she is a remote group of four or five islands isolated in the Far East and completely surrounded by enemy nations—the United States, China, the Soviet Union, Australia, New Zealand and Canada. These nations represent no fewer than 1,230,000,000 people of the democracies now compelled to become the enemies of a small group of islands inhabited only by 72,000,000.

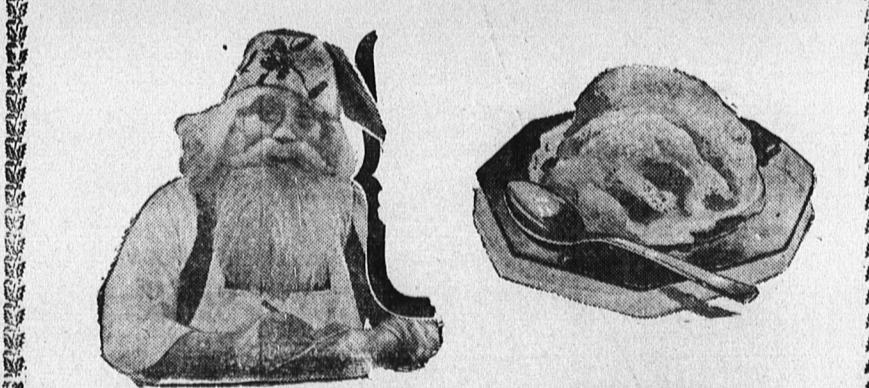
