Crown Appeal In Ferry Case Is Allowed

OTTAWA, May 15 (CP)—The Supreme Court of Canada in a judgment delivered today dismissed the appeal of Mr. Justice Acheson of the Exchequer Court of Canada and allowed the Crown's appeal in a case respecting the appropriation by the crown of two vessels owned by Northumberland Ferries, Ltd., and used in the operation of a ferry between Wood Islands, P.E.I., and Carleton Place, N.S. Northumberland Ferries, Ltd. had acquired a contract to operate this ferry for 10 years from May 1, 1940, and was to be paid a subsidy of \$20,000 yearly for 10 years by the Dominion Government. The Crown, by virtue of its powers under the War Measures Act, had taken ownership of two vessels, Seaborn and Sankaty, from the ferry company. The company claimed \$176,000 for the Seaborn and \$300,000 for the Sankaty, and, after crediting \$176,664.63 paid by the Crown in respect of acquiring the vessels, claimed a balance of \$89,335.37.

Churchill Hopes For Big 3 Meeting

LONDON, May 15 (CP)—Prime Minister Churchill told the House of Commons today he hoped to have a meeting soon with President Truman and Premier Stalin and sidestepped a direct answer on whether he believed Hitler is dead.
