Rosalind sailed from this port yesterday afternoon about twelve thirty, taking out a general cargo. The S. S. Harland made her usual trips to Orwell yesterday. She carried considerable freight and a-bout eighty passengers. Peter F. Hughes, Bedford, who has been in the Canadian West for the past year, returned to this province last night on the express. Dr. Moore of Crapaud leaves this morning on a visit to Boston, New York and Chicago. The Guardian wishes him a pleasant trip and a safe return. Lady Davies, City, who has been spending a short period with friends in Sackville, N. B., arrived in this city last night where she will spend the summer. The Misses O'Brien, St. John's, Nfld., who have been attending the Convent in Souris for the past term, were passengers returning to their homes on the Rosalind yesterday. The mail train was half an hour late last evening, arriving at ten twenty. The Cape Traverse train was the only other late train yesterday, coming in at ten twenty, twenty-five minutes late. Major Ogilvie is one of the inspecting officers of the artillery and will act in that capacity on Thursday and Friday of this week when the Artillery companies of this province will undergo inspection. MINUTES OF PRESBYTERY. At Charlottetown, and within St. James' Hall there, on Wednesday, June 29th, at eleven o'clock, a. m., the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met and was constituted by the moderator pro tempore, Mr. G. O. Ross, besides whom were present Messrs W. H. Spencer, T. F. Fullerton, D. McLean and R. R. Webster, elders. Elders' commissions were received from the following sessions, and their names ordered to be placed on the roll of Presbytery, namely, St. James', Charlottetown, Orwell and Joyville, in favor of Messrs T. C. James, John McKeegan and Alex. McCallum, respectively. Mr. T. F. Fullerton reported that he moderated in a call at Belfast, on Monday, the 13th day of June, instant, that the call came out unanimously in favor of Mr. J. W. McKenzie, St. Peter's, that it was signed by 150 communicants, Edward McKeegan, and it was accompanied with a guarantee of \$100 stipend, with use of manse. The conduct of the interim moderator, was approved. The clerk stated that he had cited the session and congregation of St. Peter's to appear for their interests at this meeting, and his action was sustained. The call was then sustained as a regular Gospel call. The following commissioners from Belfast testified to the unanimity of the people in their desire to secure the services of Mr. McKenzie, namely, Messrs M. W. Murchison, John Ross, and Angus McLeod, Messrs John McGregor, Oliver Anderson and R. R. Webster, commissioners from St. Peter's spoke of the good and faithful work done by their minister during his long pastorate, and expressed the hope that he would remain among them. The commissioners from Belfast having spoken in reply, the call was placed in the hands of Mr. McKenzie and accepted by him. On motion the translation was granted, and the induction appointed to take place at Belfast, and within St. John's church there, on Tuesday, the 19th day of July next, at eleven o'clock, a. m., the moderator of Presbytery, Mr. M. N. McLeod, to preside and induct Mr. L. Beaton to preach, and Mr. W. H. Spencer to address the minister, and Mr. T. F. Fullerton the people. Mr. D. McLean was appointed to preach and read the edict of induction at Belfast on Sabbath July 10th, and 17th. It was moved by Mr. T. F. Fullerton, seconded by Mr. A. Craise, and carried, that in connection with the translation of Mr. McKenzie we hereby place on record our appreciation of the faithful work he has done during a ministry of nearly twenty-five years, and at the same time give expression to our sympathy with the people of St. Peter's and to our hope that under God blessing they may soon have a settled pastor. Mr. R. P. Murray was appointed interim moderator of St. Peter's session, and authorized to have the pulpit declared vacant as soon as possible after the 15th day of July next. Mr. W. H. Spencer reported that applications for aid from the augmentation fund in behalf of the following congregations had been granted, namely Dundas, Hampton, Marshfield, Richmond Bay east, West River and Woodville. On motion it was decided to hold a fraternal visitation at lot 14, on Tuesday, the 9th day of August next, at one o'clock, p. m., and at lot 16 on the same day at 3.30, p. m. The clerk was instructed to cite the congregation session, and trustees to appear at these meetings. Presbytery then adjourned to meet in St. John's church, Belfast, on Tuesday, the 19th day of July next, of which public intimation was given and this adjournment was closed with the benediction.
