MARION LOUISE LOST OFF CUBA

Capt. W. H. Barnard, Wife and Crew Saved

Telegraphic advices received here by J. F. MacMillan on Saturday evening from McIntosh, Terrio & Co., shipbrokers, New York, convey the news of the wreck of the schooner Marion Louise, at Caribalen, Cuba. Capt. W. H. and Mrs. Barnard and crew were all saved. Many friends of the genial captain who for many years was one of our foremost citizens will be sorry to hear of his loss, but will be gratified to know that the lives of himself and wife have been spared.

CAMPAIGN AT HUNTER RIVER.

present circumstances. He defied the Liberal party to place their hands on one public work between Halifax and Vancouver that would justify the expenditure upon it. There was no necessity for the building of the Transcontinental Railway at the present time. Let the Intercolonial be extended if more railway accommodation is necessary. The controllable expenditure has increased from \$30,000,000 to over \$60,000,000 and there is absolutely no justification; of this Mr. Barnard had said nothing. The Liberals have renounced principles, principles that are eternal, and we must support those who will stand by their principles. There is no freight in the Northwest that cannot be handled by the existing line. If the manufacturers were encouraged as they should be the imports would not exceed the exports. The policy of the Liberals is a commercial tariff that will kill every industry of Canada unless power be entrusted to the men who made the National Policy and who alone can properly administer it. Dr. McNeill concluded with a plea for the New London District for railway extension to that section and for greater consideration of its needs. He concluded amid loud cheers.

Captain Joseph Read quoted a statement from the Collector of Customs saying there was no duty on binder twine either to or from Canada. He stated that Canada had now a tariff for revenue against a previous tariff for protection. Captain Read discussed the quarantine regulations for Canadian cattle and said the Conservatives in this as in all the other questions, argued in a circle. He quoted the blue books to show the fallacy of the Conservatives' arguments. The lower postage had made an Imperial unity that binds the Empire together.

At this point Mr. McDonald, the Patriot reporter, rose and read some selections from the blue books to show that Dr. McNeill was incorrect in his statements regarding newspaper postage. Captain Read continued by eulogizing Mr. Hazard, the friend of the people and the supporter of the people's government. The speaker grew eloquent at the prosperity of Canada during the past seven years and concluded by a defence of the Grand Trunk Pacific.

Brief speeches were given, touching on some pertinent questions, by A. A. McLean, who had arrived in the meantime, and D. A. McKinnon. At the conclusion, the meeting broke up with cheers for the candidates.
