He arrived in Toronto December 15th but had to put up at a hotel for one month as there was no room in the hospital for him. He had only been in the institution about two weeks when he passed away of consumption of the throat. Much sympathy is felt for Mrs. Toombs, formerly Miss Carrie Mattart, B-deque, in her double bereavement, she having buried her only child on the day in which she received the news of the death of her affectionate husband.

If the rest of the team are to be judged by the accomplished captain's course way of expressing himself, it may be inferred that whatever terms deserve to be applied to their playing, such words as gentlemanly, courteous, would be strangely out of place in connection with such vulgarly characterized letter of the villainous Captain of the North Sydney. It really appears as if the aborigines are not at all confined to the western portion of this Dominion.

MR. JUSTICE HODGSON, Master of the Rolls, delivered judgment Thursday in re the application of John McMurrer for writ of Habeas Corpus for his discharge from Queen's County Jail under a commitment under the hand of the Stipendiary Magistrate of Queen's County for violation of the Prohibition Act. The principal grounds urged by E. O. Brown, counsel for the prisoner, were that the commitment did not show jurisdiction by the committing magistrate, and that the commitment cannot be held over after conviction for any space of time. The Master of the Rolls held that the substituted commitment put in by the prosecution on the trial subsequent to the first for Habeas Corpus was sufficient to cover the defect in the former commitment. The commitment under which the prisoner is held being good, the Master of the Rolls ordered the prisoner to be remanded to jail. Attorney General Peters for the prosecution; E. O. Brown for the prisoner.

VERY sad was the sudden and unexpected death of Mrs. H. A. Robertson, of Alexandra, Lot 49, which took place on Saturday, the 9th inst., after an illness of five days. The deceased had had a slight cold, succeeded by pneumonia, which added to heart-weakness caused despite the best of medical skill and careful nursing the sudden death of the patient. Mrs. Robertson was a woman of kindly nature and retiring disposition, ever ready to lend a helping hand when neighbor or friend was in need. Her kindly ministrations will be missed by many. She was an affectionate and dutiful wife, and a loving mother. For husband and children there has gone out a light not to be relighted; a place vacated not to be refilled. She was a devout Christian, having quitted with the Alexandra Baptist Church some years ago, having been baptized by Rev. D. G. McDodall. During the time she was associated with the church she, by her life and conversation, exemplified the principles of the Gospel and the teachings of Christ her Saviour. There is left to mourn a husband, a young family consisting of two sons and three daughters, an aged father, mother, and mother-in-law, three brothers, William H. Judson James H. Judson, and George Judson, all of Alexandra; three sisters, Mrs. Wm. Drake, of Charlottetown; Mrs. Seymour McLellan, of Alexandra; and Miss Mary Judson, of Alexandra. The esteem in which the deceased was held was evidenced by the vast concourse of people who attended the funeral held on Monday, the 11th inst., there being about one hundred sleighs in the funeral procession. Services were held at the house and in the Alexandra Baptist Church, conducted by Rev. G. R. White of Charlottetown, and Rev. D. R. Chowan of Pownal. The address of Rev. Mr. White was appropriate and touching, in which he dwelt upon the characteristics of the heavenly home.

A LARGE audience, a good part of which were C.B.C. students, witnessed the two games of basket ball at the Y.M.C.A. last evening. For a sensational and exciting finish the game between the Abbies and business men capped anything this year. The business men led in the scoring in the game until a few minutes of the finish when the Abbies pulled up and tied the score 13-13. According to rule the game was played off—the team scoring the first two points to be the winner. Here again the teams showed themselves evenly matched, the business men scoring one point from a free throw; then the Abbies tied the score again by a free throw. After a few minutes of very fast and exciting playing L. S. Crosby, for the Abbies, caged a very neat goal thus winning the game. The game between the C. B. C. and Vics was an entirely different style of game. The Vics, were weakened by the absence of L. Reddin and the whole team played a much inferior game to that usually put up by them. The C. B. C. on the other hand played one of the strongest games they have ever put up and won by a score of 33-7. It looks now as though the C. B. C. champions had a strong claim on the trophy, though there is yet a possibility for some of the other teams.
