### THE LATE JAMES HESSIAN

The late James Hessian, one of the victims of Sunday's railway accident, was a son of the late Thomas Hessian, Georgetown, and was about 45 years of age. He had been employed on different parts of the road and was a most efficient railwayman. He leaves a widow and four children: Evelyn Frederick, Louise, and Phyllis. Mrs. Hessian arrived home two weeks ago from Montreal, where she had been under hospital treatment for about six months. One sister, Gertrude, in Los Angeles, and four brothers, Jack in New Glasgow, Edmund, in London, Ont., Emmet in Milwaukee, Wis., (a brother-in-law of Hon. W. D. Ross, Ex-Lieutenant Governor of Ontario), and Stephen, K. C., barrister-at-law, Montague, survive him. Mr. Stephen Hessian left Montague for Charlottetown yesterday. Mr. Hessian has instructed the body of his brother to be taken to Georgetown and the funeral will be held from there on Wednesday at 10 o'clock.

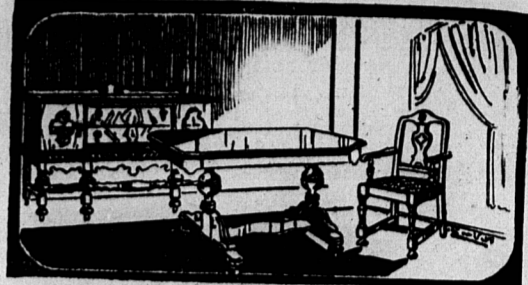

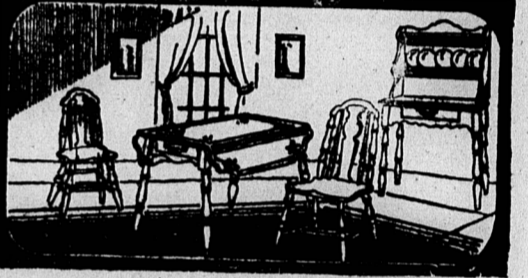
