**IN MEMORIAM**

MR. DONALD JOHNSTONE.

Mr Donald Johnstone, an old and respected resident of Cardigan Head, passed away on February 20th. The deceased had enjoyed fair health all his life, until recently when he began to fail. He was of a kind, genial disposition and was greatly missed in the home. Charity and hospitality were the leading virtues in his generous nature, and he was always ready to help. He was born at New Perth in 1837, and when quite young came with his parents to Cardigan Head, where he has since resided, and where he has done much toward the upbuilding of the community. Mr. Johnstone's funeral was largely attended, friends and relatives coming to pay a farewell tribute to the departed. The services were conducted by Rev. James Martin, and the pall-bearers were Mr. McLeod, Nell MacCannell, John McAulay, and John McDonald. The interment took place in Lorne Valley Cemetery.

**THE LATE M. G. DICKIESON.**

After an illness which for several years confined him to his house, Mr. Matthew George Dickieson, a well-known resident of Ottawa, passed away quietly last Sunday afternoon at his residence, 201 Macaron Street, at the Ottawa News. Although Mr. Dickieson had been an invalid for a long time, there was little indication, prior to his death, that the end was approaching. He had lately contracted a cold, which, however, appeared to have left him, but this may have been partly responsible for his death. Mr. Dickieson was born at New Glasgow, Prince Edward Island, 67 years ago, and received his early education in the vicinity of his birthplace. When a young man he went to the Canadian West as private secretary to Governor Laird, subsequently taking a position as Indian Agent in the west, where he was stationed at the time of the Riel Rebellion. After holding that position a few years he returned to his home department and, at the time of his superannuation was Dominion book-keeper. Besides a widow Mr. Dickieson left two daughters, Mrs. C. P. Edwards, and Miss Ella Dickieson, both of Ottawa, and one son, Mr. A. L. Dickieson of Toronto. The funeral was held from his late residence on MacLaren St., to Beechwood Cemetery yesterday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock, service being conducted at the house by Rev. H. R. Stevenson, of Montreal, a cousin of the deceased. The floral offerings were many and beautiful.

**INSTRUCTION IN ELEMENTARY AGRICULTURE**

(Continued from Page Four.)

Agriculture provided a second summer school for teachers in July 1914. It was held in Charlottetown, lasted three weeks and was attended by about two-thirds of all the teachers in the province. For the guidance of these teachers a well thought out course in nature study was drawn up by experts, and as an encouragement to put forth their best efforts teachers were given an opportunity to win a substantial bonus by doing well the work of the "Rural Science" course. To be entitled to this bonus teachers must have a well kept school garden properly used in the instruction of the pupils and have also five "home projects" being conducted in five different homes. Five additional "home projects" are regarded as equivalent to a school garden and the more "home projects" successfully conducted the greater the amount of the bonus.

It is perhaps too early to speak of results, but the outlook is certainly encouraging. We feel that we are on the right track and that we are succeeding in making "Rural Science" a vital part of the training of country boys and girls. Already in hundreds of schools children are being taught to observe and to do, to recognise the beauty and significance of common things, to realise the dignity of labour and the joys of country life. They are learning, too, to look to their own province, its still undeveloped resources and its splendid opportunities as a fitting field for their future toils and triumphs.

**FARMER BURNED TO DEATH IN BARN.**

GAGETOWN, N. B. March 3.—Mr. Thomas George Williams, aged about 45, and one of the best known farmers in this district, was burned to death in a fire which destroyed one of his barns at Queenstown at the head of Onobog Lake, Thursday night, together with twenty-five head of cattle.

**AGRICULTURAL VALUES IN 1914.**

A press bulletin issued today by the Census and Statistics Office summarizes the results of inquiries made by crop-reporting correspondents as to (1) the values of farm land, (2) the values of farm help and (3) the values of farm live stock in 1914.

**VALUES OF FARM LAND.**

For the whole of Canada the average value of farm land held for agricultural purposes, whether improved or unimproved, and including the value of dwelling houses, farms, stables and other farm buildings, is returned as \$38.41 per acre, which is about equal to that of the last similar inquiry in 1910, when the value was given as \$35.45 per acre. In 1911 the average was returned by the Census as \$30.41, but this value was based upon returns from all occupiers, including farms only recently settled and therefore of less value. By provinces the average value of 1914 was \$42.42 per acre in Alberta to \$156 per acre in British Columbia. In this province however the high value is due to orcharding, ordinary agriculture being subsidiary to fruit culture.

**WAGES FOR FARM HELP.**

In recent years the wages of farm help have increased considerably, and they reached their highest point during the bumper harvest of 1913. But in 1914 the pendulum swung back, less labour being required on farms owing to lighter crops. Since August the war has had for one of its effects an increase in the supply of farm labour and consequently a fall in the wages. The demand for labour this winter has also decreased because of the increased cost of board. For the Dominion the average wages per month during the summer, including board, were \$35.55 for male and \$18.81 for female help. For the year, including board, the average wages were \$223.20 for males and \$189.35 for females, whilst the average cost of board per month works out to \$14.27 for males and \$11.20 for females, as compared with \$12.49 and \$9.53 in 1910. Average wages per month in 1914 were lowest in Prince Edward Island, viz. \$24.71 for males and \$14.48 for females; in Nova Scotia they were \$31.20 and \$14.80 and in New Brunswick \$31.93 and \$15. In Quebec the averages were \$33.56 and \$16.55, and in Ontario \$32.09 and \$16.77. In the western provinces they were for males \$39.13 in Manitoba, \$40.51 in Saskatchewan and \$40.26 in Alberta, and for females \$22.35 in Manitoba, \$22.96 in Saskatchewan and \$23.63 in Alberta. The highest wages were paid in British Columbia, viz. \$47.85 for males and \$31.18 for females, these averages being substantially less than in 1910 when males received \$57.40 and females \$38.

**VALUES OF FARM LIVE STOCK.**

Values are well maintained so far as comparison with the three years ending 1910 is concerned, but during 1914 there has been a substantial reduction in the value both of horses and of swine. It is a cause of general complaint that the demand for horses other than for military purposes has fallen off, and that prices are less by 25 per cent. Owing to the high price of grain the keeping of swine in the west is said to be no longer a paying proposition. Hogs have been sold for what they will fetch—frequently for as little as 3½ cents per lb.—and many have been marketed in an unfinished condition. On the other hand the prices of cattle have been well maintained and the average values for dairy cows and for other horned cattle are considerably above those of 1910. The average per head for all Canada came to \$127 for horses, \$57 for milch cows, \$42 for other cattle, \$7 for sheep and \$12 for swine. The following is believed to be a rough approximation of the total value of farm live stock in 1914: Canadian farm live stock in 1914: 1,000,000 horses \$27,430,000, cattle \$297,131,000, sheep \$14,551,000 and swine \$42,418,000, or an aggregate of \$725,550,000 for all descriptions.
