The public bequests are as follows:—\$50 each to Charlottetown Hospital and St. Joseph's Convent; \$300 for the building fund of the new Cathedral; \$400 for masses for the repose of his soul; \$200 for masses for his brother John Hagan; \$100 each for his mother Rose Hagan; \$100 each for his father Charles Hagan; \$100 each for masses for his sisters and for masses for the souls in purgatory. The remainder of the estate, valued at about \$5000, is to be divided among his relatives.
