# PRISONER RELEASED

### From Queen's County Jail Before term

## SENTENCE HAD EXPIRED

### How And Why It Was Done. The Authorities' Explanation.

THE GUARDIAN is informed that about a week ago Mrs. Coady of Newtown, who had been previously convicted and imprisoned in the Queen's County jail, was released from imprisonment by the Jailor on written instructions signed by Premier Farquharson and Attorney General Peter Stipendary Palmer, before whom Mrs. Coady was convicted and committed, was waited upon by a GUARDIAN reporter yesterday but he declined to be interviewed in regard to the matter, by reason of his connection with the judicial proceedings in the case. A letter was published in yesterday's GUARDIAN referring to this matter in addition to which there are current reports to the following effect: That following Mrs. Coady's imprisonment a petition was circulated, and was signed by some twenty persons, relatives and neighbors of Mrs. Coady asking for her liberation on the alleged grounds that a son of hers was ill at home and needed her presence and attendance; that after receipt of this petition Premier Farquharson wrote Stipendary Palmer, stating the case and asking that he, the Stipendary should order the prisoner's release; that this the Stipendary declined to do, believing that he had no power to warrant such action; that afterwards, on being informed of the Stipendary's declination written instructions signed by the Premier and Attorney General were handed to the Jailor, who thereupon released Mrs. Coady and she returned to her home. Premier Farquharson was next waited upon and asked in reference to the reports that are current as to the release of Mrs. Coady. The Premier stated that anything he had to say in reference to the matter would appear in the Patriot of last evening. At this stage he had nothing further to say. The representative then asked him if the reply referred to dealt with his lawful jurisdiction to order such release? The Premier in reply stated that in extreme cases it is necessary to go outside of jurisdiction. It was not the first time he had done so and he intimated it might not be the last. [From the Patriot.] In reply to THE GUARDIAN's correspondent this morning, and the editorial comment on the letter, we have been authorized to state that the woman who was released from Queen's County Jail, received her liberty because her son was seriously ill, a certificate to this effect, having been furnished by a competent physician. There is also a petition from that section of the country signed by all the neighbors except two and headed by the priest of the parish, who writes a letter, setting forth the case, and asking that she be released. The petition has twenty-two signatures, of a good respectable citizens. If THE GUARDIAN or its correspondent has anything further to say on the matter, we shall be pleased to hear from them.
