(By The Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Jan. 23.—There is no disposition on the part of Montreal Royals to sell Quebec Aces short, even if the Quebec Senior Hockey League leaders are holding a 10-point margin on last year's Allan Cup winners.

With the season past the halfway mark, the Q.S.H.L. has developed into what is virtually a straight battle between the long-standing rivals to decide who will represent the league in provincial play-offs.

Royals have held the edge for most of the season but Aces have a habit of finishing strongly and there are still the league play-offs ahead.

At the moment, Royals have 27 points to Aces' 17, but have played two additional games. Hull Volants and Ottawa Commandos are scrambling for third spot but have little hopes of getting any further.

Except for one upset victory that Hull pulled over Aces, neither of the two lower teams has been able to beat either of the leaders all season.

Whether it be Royals or Aces who represent the Q.S.H.L., the chances are they'll be meeting the Valleyfield Braves in the provincial final, although none of the other three teams in the inter-provincial league can be ruled out as yet.
