TEH BOODLERS WILL BE PROSECUTED

"Mr. Foster is a very young man and inexperienced in business. He did not make a profit, but I am bound to say his explanation of his undertaking as a duty, and his explanation, if it can be called an explanation, of his failure to provide supervision and bring back vouchers for all money paid out, was far from satisfactory."

Disapproves Garland's Action. Referring to Mr. Garland, he said "Dowell was employed by him and was not only permitted, but encouraged and assisted in making the contract with the government by which he made \$9,000 profit in a few weeks."

"I can't for a moment give my sanction or approval to conduct of that character. It certainly arouses suspicion, and every member of Parliament should keep above suspicion."

"So as to these two members I feel I owe it as a duty to the Government of which I am the head, to the party, of which in federal matters I am the leader, and to this House and the country to express very grave disapproval of the matters in which they were concerned and which were under investigation in the Public Accounts Committee."

The Prime Minister then announced that the Government was going to appoint a commission of either one man or three men to take full direction and control of the purchase of all the supplies to be paid for out of the \$100,000,000 voted by Parliament.

Whether the Government appointed one man or three it intended to get the very best men available, the most experienced and most capable business men in the country regardless of any other consideration. We want to take all means and provide every safeguard to see that not one dollar shall be wasted so that at another session of Parliament we can give an account of our stewardship that will be satisfactory not only to Parliament but to the whole country."

Will Prosecute All Fraud. Sir Robert then referred to the resolution passed by the Public Accounts committee at the instance of Mr. W. F. Nickle, asking that there should be an improved system of auditing, purchasing and accounting. He was thoroughly in sympathy with this resolution, although he would say that no legislation could prevent fraud where there were crooked men. As soon as the resolution was passed he sent for Hon. Mr. White and asked him to bring together the Deputy Ministers and the Auditor General, and see what legislation they would recommend.

Sir Robert pointed out that the Public Accounts Committee had been sitting six weeks and had inquired into purchases of some eighty million dollars. They had imposed no limit on the investigation and the Conservative members had insisted on its being thorough. After a most searching inquiry all the money which had been found to go astray was some twelve thousand dollars. Of this amount \$8,300 had already been recovered.

Early in the war he had discussed the matter of purchasing with his cabinet. They had laid down the principle that all purchases except under exceptional cases should be from manufacturers and producers direct. This

was discussed on many occasions. When acting Minister of Militia he so instructed General Fiset. Sir Robert read correspondence he had had with General Sam Hughes in which he insisted on this principle, and asked where it was deviated from he should be notified. General Hughes heartily agreed and said that he was endeavoring to carry out this policy. In October his attention was drawn by the Minister of Customs to rumors which were afloat that a man had stated he was forced to pay five hundred dollars into the party funds. An inquiry was made. Orders were given by him for the fullest investigation. It was found this man had kept five hundred dollars of his employers' money and had skipped the country. "I want to say to Parliament and to the country that if there is any man, whether he be Conservative or Liberal, who has committed fraud in this country, let him remember that there are courts of justice and the doors of the penitentiary are yawning wide open."

Hazel Hill, Canso, N. S. April 13th, 1915 To Major C. Leigh, Heavy Brigade and O. C. Troops, Canso, N. S. Dear Major Leigh,

And we cannot let this opportunity pass without showing in some small manner the high regard in which you are held by the men of the battery. In this critical period when "England expects every man to do his duty," we are experiencing our first Active Service. Since you have had command of the troops at this Station we realize that you have spared no pains to make our lot as easy as possible to us, we are sorry to say, have gone past the limits in some cases, but at no time did we get more punishment than we richly deserved.

We are sorry to lose you as our Commanding Officer, and will always look back with pleasant recollections to the period which is about to close. On behalf of the boys of the P. E. Island Heavy Brigade, kindly convey to Mrs. Leigh this token of our respect accompanied by our best wishes. Also to you Sir, please accept this gift, not because of its value, but on account of the spirit in which it is given. With all good wishes, we remain, N. C. PAGE CALLS ON GREY.

LONDON, April 19.—Walter H. Page, the American ambassador, called upon Foreign Secretary Grey at the Foreign Office today and discussed the reprisals the Germans are reported to be making because of the special treatment being accorded by Great Britain to the officers and men captured on board German submarines. No official advices have been received in London as yet concerning the actual steps Germany is taking to punish the thirty-nine British officers who are reported to have been committed to special detention because of the steps taken by England against the German prisoners.

Ambassador Page today received a message from Washington saying that James W. Gerard, the American ambassador at Berlin, had only newspaper reports of the reprisals said to have been put into effect by Germany, but that replies were expected immediately to inquiries asking for specific information as to what Germany is doing.
