ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

CHRISTMAS day—a week from to-day.
PEOPLE are crossing the East River at Hickey's wharf.
At the Police Court yesterday George Donovan drank was fined \$5 or 30 days.
THE steamer Elliott left yesterday for St. John's, Nfld., with a full cargo of oats, hay and sheep.
It is understood that Rev. Geo. M. Young has declined the call recently received from the Church at Tryon.
F. B. ARMOUR is enlarging and improving the rink lunch-room. It is being removed to a more convenient section of the building.
THE Guardian has received from L. E. Miller a neat booklet entitled Business Education as conducted at the Charlottetown Business College.

THE Official Board of the Cornwall Circuit have extended an invitation to Rev. Wm. Harrison of Dorchester, late of Grace Church, this city.
THE City of Ghent is now in Souris and will remain there till Saturday. Any freight to be shipped by her should be sent by rail to Souris.

WHEN the Hillsboro goes off the ferry route this winter she will be hauled up at Poole's lumber yard and receive a thorough caulking and coppering.
THE funeral of the late Mrs. Stumbles takes place from the residence of her daughter Mrs. Albert Crosby, Fitzroy Street east to-day at 2.45 p. m. by train to Sherwood.

THE Hillsboro kept open the crossing to Southport all yesterday but considerable difficulty is expected with floating ice to-day. The Elfin made two trips to Rocky Point and will run again today if possible.

THE Rink Managers desire to announce through The Guardian that the Rink will be opened for the season on Christmas afternoon and evening, The 4th Regiment Band will be in attendance on both occasions and will give special concert programs.

THE Northumberland did not return from Picton yesterday owing to the bad weather, consequently there was no mail. She will leave on return to Charlottetown this morning at daybreak. If possible the Princess will leave here for Picton at the usual hour.

THE latest order issued regarding the mails is that they shall go by the Summerside Point du Chene route. A special leaves Charlottetown each evening at eight o'clock, Saturday excluded for Summerside connecting with the Stanley that leaves in the morning at seven.

A HANDSOME oak woodwork railing in harmony with the colors of the church woodwork has been placed in front of choir and organ of the Baptist Church. The work was done by James Stewart and greatly improves the appearance of the auditorium. The church has also procured an individual communion set which will go into use the beginning of the new year.

THE death took place on Tuesday of one of the old residents of Charlottetown in the person of Mrs. William Stumbles at the advanced age of eighty years. The deceased was the daughter of the late John Trenaman and was born in 1823 on the site of the present Prowse Block, Sunnyside. The late Mrs. Stumbles leaves to mourn five daughters all of whom were at the dying bedside, Misses Mary and Sarah residing in the United States; Mrs. Albert Crosby, Charlottetown; Mrs. J. R. Stewart, Lisbon, North Dakota; Mrs. Hammond Kelly, Southport; and two sons William of the Marine department, Ottawa; and Stephen in Malden Mass. To the bereaved The Guardian extends its sincere sympathy.

ON Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of this week Rev. H. G. Gratz, M. A. of Alberton delivered his popular lecture on Korea to appreciative audiences at Hampton, Bonshaw and Tryon. The geographical and political situation of Korea; its relation to the Eastern problem; its resources; its people socially and morally considered, with especial reference to the great work being done there by our Presbyterian missionaries, were graphically described and illustrated by the learned lecturer. Over fifty five stereopticon views, taken from actual life by our missionaries on the field were exhibited. Mr. Gratz was tendered the customary votes of thanks for his highly instructive and interesting lecture. A snug sum was collected in aid of the Korean mission.

Miss P. M. Ayers of Charlottetown after visiting in Boston and New York has come to Bangor to take a position as missionary for the Central Congregational church. She is splendidly equipped for the work, having had the best sort of training. Beside actual work in the world she has studied for two years at the Springfield Training School for Christian Workers. Her duties at the Central church will be in connection with the Sunday school and the local missionary work of the church which has been carried on for some years past with excellent results. It is expected that under Miss Ayers' leadership much can be done to extend this feature of the Central church's work. She will occupy largely with the visitation of the sick, the distribution of charitable aid, calling upon children and families of the church.—Bangor News [Miss Ayers is a sister of Dr. J. H. Ayers of this city.]

THE Supreme Court of Canada has just finished the longest continuous session in its history. At the opening of the court on Oct. 6 there had been set down to be heard eighteen cases from the maritime provinces, thirteen from the province of Quebec, two from the Yukon Territory, eight from British Columbia, five from Manitoba and ten from Ontario, a total of fifty-six appeals. In addition to this, the court dealt with a number of applications for leave to appeal and motions to quash. At the close of the session, the court had heard and given judgment in all the cases argued except eight, which were argued during the last two weeks and stand over for judgment. The appeal case of Patrick Doherty, Charlottetown was dismissed with costs of both courts the appellant failing to prosecute.

REV. Dr. Hunt read a most interesting paper before the Natural History and Antiquarian Society last night upon some of the Antiquities of the United States. The learned lecturer, after a passing mention of the great antiquity of the geological formations, of the animal remains, and of man on this continent, considered at length the mounds found in abundance in many parts of the United States, especially in Ohio. The shape, size and position of these mounds were considered, the different conjectures as to their use discussed and a detailed description given of the human remains and of articles found during excavations in these works. The second part of the paper was devoted to a description of the habitations of the Cave Dwellers and the pueblo (or village) ruins of Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado and Utah. Here again the articles found were described and an estimate made of the stature, occupations, habits and history of the builders. The paper was full of instructive information and was listened to by the audience with close attention and appreciation. The paper was discussed by the President and Messrs. W. C. Harris, John Newson, L. W. Watson, L. L. Beer and E. J. Rendle. A vote of thanks, proposed and seconded by John Newson and E. J. Rendle respectively, was tendered to Dr. Hunt by whom it was fittingly acknowledged.
