PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, Jan. 24.—Holding their wickets all day by cautious batting, the West Indies cricket team had piled up 284 first innings runs for the loss of nine at the close of play tonight in their second test match, against the touring Marylebone Cricket Club of England.

Hard-hitting J. E. D. Sealey of Barbados was in fine form today, almost reaching a century before being bowled out by Captain R. E. S. Wyatt. With clever cutting and brilliant drives he ran up a score of 92 before a Wyatt spin broke up his innings. He slammed out 13 fours.

Dusky Leary Constatine, the English county cricketer, also had a good day and was still not out when stumps were drawn. Having batted for 94 minutes, he was in partnership with Sealey for a time and collected 73 runs for the West Indies cause, including his eight fours.

Playing before a huge crowd which swelled in the afternoon to more than 10,000 and overflowed the seating capacity of the Port of Spain oval, both teams gave beautiful exhibitions. Favored by beautiful weather, the wicket was in perfect condition.

John Smith led the English attack against West Indies wickets. Captain Wyatt was also a dangerous bowler and his steady ball took a goodly West Indian toll which included their leading scorer, Sealey, and the usually formidable B. Grant, who was bowled out on the first ball.

England won the first test match two weeks ago in Barbados by four wickets.
