WHAT MIGHT BE DONE.

The Canadian Pacific Railway encourages its station masters to beautify their station grounds, by planting ornamental trees and shrubs, and by cultivating flower plots and gardens. To assist this work the company makes an annual distribution of seeds, with full instructions for planting, arranging and cultivating so as to bring the best results. It is also the policy of the company to excite a spirit of emulation among station masters so that each may do his best to have his station the most attractive along the line.

The idea is not new with the Canadian Pacific people. They began it years ago, and for that matter a number of American railways have done the same, creating bowers of summer beauty at all the principal stopping places along their lines to gratify and refresh their passengers, and add to the delights of travel. It is no small task thus to create a succession of flower gardens across the broad continent from the Atlantic to the Pacific, but it will pay good returns, if not in immediate ready money, at least indirectly by attracting travel, and as an advertisement of the artistic taste and love for the beautiful which characterize this great and progressive railway company.

There is a hint in this for the Government railway system on the mainland and Prince Edward Island. Here and there along these lines there has been a more or less successful attempt to create a flower garden beside a station, but usually as the result of individual taste and energy. What seems to be needed is the adoption of a general policy of beautification to be assisted and encouraged in a similar manner to that adopted by the great company we have referred to. It should be directed from headquarters and made general along all the Government lines. If to the splendid roadway, good stations and fine equipment of rolling stock were added more tasteful and ornamental station grounds, tourist travel would be stimulated and a love for the beautiful would be cultivated throughout all the country served by the Government lines.

THE INSURANCE BILL GOES DOWN.

It is now given out semi-officially that the Insurance Bill, which has been before Parliament for some months, will not be passed during this session, but will go over till next session. Not very many will regret the decision. There is much less feeling of urgency in the country in regard to insurance legislation than there was a year ago. The public mind had been somewhat excited by the revelations in regard to the big New York companies, and it was before this excitement had subsided that the Canadian Insurance Commission conducted its investigation, and upon its report the bill now pending was framed. It is safer to legislate in the calm than under stress of storm, and it may be better to await the results of the rather drastic legislation adopted in New York and other states before taking action which is not for the moment urgently needed.

The events of the past year above referred to somewhat disturbed both the Canadian insurance companies and the fraternal orders which are conducting an insurance business. More recently the insurance business has revived and is going on with much of its former progress and strength. Public confidence if at all shaken, has been restored, with the growing belief that insurance in Canada is on a sounder basis than ever before. There is therefore no urgent need of immediate legislation. A number of provisions in the Insurance Bill have been the subject of debate and controversy, and another year may bring with it fuller light. The test of actual working out of new legislation across the border

will be of great value. And a new Parliament fresh from the people, will be less distracted from the serious business of legislation by party warfare and bitterness than is the present moribund Parliament.

Winston Churchill will get another seat easily enough, it is said. His defeat seems to have been largely due to the licensing bill and the education bill. The first of these is opposed by the brewers and the liquor interest generally, while the established Church opposed the latter. The combination which is sometimes sneered at as "Bible and Beer" proved in this case very strong. Still it must be remembered that "Free Trade versus Tariff" figured largely in the campaign discussion.

New Brunswick has a new Legislature which has been opened very late in the season, the latter fact being due to the fact that there is also a new government which needed time in which to prepare its measures. Some compensation may be found in the fact that the Governor wore at the opening his Windsor uniform, with cocked hat and dress sword, was surrounded by a brilliant staff and the state dinner following was unusually well-appointed. The mea-

sures promised include a new highway act, cheaper school books and an audit act, which all seem to be highly desirable.

The provincial election campaign in Ontario opens at once. Nomination day is fixed for June 1 and polling on June 8. The last election was held January 25, 1905. The result then was 70 Conservatives, 23 Liberals.

A bridge across the St. Lawrence just below Montreal has been for some time contemplated, but now there is a movement to substitute a Tunnel as likely to prove less costly and more satisfactory. The Quebec Bridge disaster, and its enormous cost brings the Tunnel idea into favor.

The telegraph operators of Canada are petitioning the Government for an eight hour day. Very few callings in Canada can afford so short a day's work. Very few of those who work for themselves, or who employ others to work for them, are content to limit themselves to a day of eight hours. Perhaps if the truth was known most employers work longer hours and also more industriously than those whom they employ. There are too many of the class who would be glad to avoid all work between meals if they could do so.
