PROMINENT MORE SANTA JOURNALIST PALS WANTED TO VISIT HERE

Mr. Bertram B. Fowler, Co-operative Movement Authority Will Study Adult Education Program of Province.

Mr. Bertram B. Fowler, prominent American journalist and authority on the co-operative movement, will visit Prince Edward Island to study the adult education program of this province. He will be the guest of the Adult Education League.

The United States writer was expected to arrive in Charlottetown Wednesday night from Nova Scotia where he has been studying the work of adult education carried on under the direction of St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish.

A similar program has been inaugurated in this province by the Adult Education League and Mr. Fowler will visit the various co-operatives and credit unions in Charlottetown on Thursday, and it was expected he would meet leaders of the movement in the Confederation Chamber of the Provincial Building.

He will also attend the re-organization meeting of the 13 study clubs in the Mount Stewart district before leaving the Island.

These study clubs are coming together for their second winter of study. As a result of last year's work a credit union, a cooperative cannery, and a buying club have been formed. Mr. Fowler will also inspect the Ligonian Credit Union in Charlottetown at a meeting of study club and credit union members to be held at the Parish Hall at Upper Queen St. The general public is also invited to attend this meeting, Wednesday at 8.30 p.m.

Although Mr. Fowler has been writing syndicated newspaper articles for years, he is most widely known for his writings on co-operation in the United States. Last year he travelled over the entire Midwest gathering material on this area. His studies were first published in a series of newspaper articles and were incorporated later into his most recent book, "Co-operative Cooperation in America."

This book, written in a flowing, graphic style is considered one of the finest non-fiction books written during the past year. It has been a "best-seller" from the start and has been a large factor in making the United States "co-operative consciousness." It will be remembered that last summer President Roosevelt sent a commission to report on the cooperatives in the Scandinavian countries. This, together with an awakened interest in the cooperative movement all over the United States, was believed due in no small part to Mr. Fowler's writings.

Using an Egyptian locale for most of the picture's setting instead of their customary American background, Bert Wheeler and Robert Woolsey hit a new comedy high in "Mummy's Boys," their latest picture.
As a couple of amateur excavators who give up their job of digging ditches in the Bronx in favor of digging up tombs on the Nile, the two Kings of Cackinnation have evolved one of the funniest pictures of their screen career. Their progress is linked up with a steamship collision, stealthy Orientals and a deceptful murder mystery.
Barbara Pepper supplies the heart interest as the daughter of one of the scientists on the expedition to the tomb of Pharaoh Phartime, and Frank M. Thomas and Moroni Olsen do excellently as the two archaeologists. Willie Best, Mitchell Lewis and Francis McDonald head the supporting cast of this hilariously entertaining film, which Fred Guol has directed in a manner that takes full advantage of its many laugh-provoking situations.
