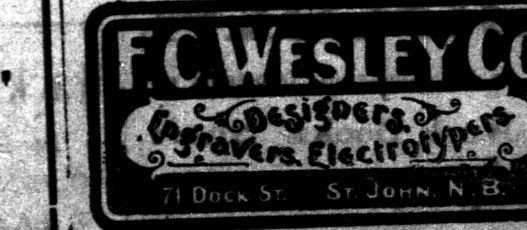

COUNCIL MEETING

The Epidemic Hospital And Becomes Virulent in Saint John.

2 WRITS AGAINST CITY

The Duke's Reply—Lights, Milk Vendors License, and Snow on Sidewalks Discussed.

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held in the Council Chamber yesterday evening. His Worship Mayor Warburton, and all the councillors with the exception of Coun. Kelly were present. His Worship intimated to the Council that he had received the Duke's official reply to the address presented by the City of Charlottetown.

The infectious hospital matter was again brought before the Council by the submitting of a report prepared by the Health Officer which dealt with the house on the Mount Edward Road, occupied by a family named Steel and owned by the City and a property owned by Mr. William Sellar and known as the Strawberry Hill property. The former place he condemned owing to its close proximity to the reservoir. He recommended the securing of the latter house under one of the conditions named in his report. The securing of a hospital was discussed at length and when the matter had been thoroughly ventilated it was left in the same stage as when it was introduced. His Worship the Mayor submitted a communication from the Minister of Militia in reference to the removal of the guns from the Barrack ground.

A communication was read from the inhabitants of Malpeque Road in reference to a light opposite the old brewery property. The petition presented asked for the removal of the lamp to the corner of Hensley Street. After discussion the matter was referred to a committee consisting of the Councillors of Ward 5.

Coun. Taylor thought that in placing guns in the Gardens a specimen from Cape Town would be something to be desired. His Worship concurred in this opinion and promised to do all in his power toward the securing of one for the Province.

The paying of milk vendors taxes by Messrs J. O. McDonald and Edward Cameron was brought up by Coun Brown. It was contended that these gentlemen were large tax payers and as such were not liable to the \$15 dollars tax. The matter was disposed of by Mr. Whar intimating that at next meeting of the Council he would move certain amendments to the bye law respecting milk vendors.

Upon enquiry being made by Coun. Brown it was learned that a writ has been issued against the city by Mrs. Walter Lowe for injuries alleged to have been sustained to her leg by a defective sidewalk. A writ has also been issued against the city by George Vessey claiming damages sustained by the selling of his woodsleigh for his poll tax. The plaintiff contends that he is not liable to a poll tax, being a non resident of the city. Vessey is a truckman and pays a regular license.

The removal of snow from the sidewalks was discussed and the Council adjourned.
