## MOCK PARLIAMENT.

The Robertson Government Defeated—  
F. B. McRae Called on to Form a Cabinet.

The Mock Parliament of the Y. M. C. A. last night opened a few minutes after eight, the speaker being escorted to the chair by the Clerk of the House.

The House being called to order the Premier introduced his Cabinet. The appointments were unanimously criticised by the Leader of the Opposition.

A resolution published in yesterday's Guardian was then submitted by the Finance Minister. His speech was logical, of times brilliant, and warm applause greeted a forceful presentation of the Government's measure.

It was followed by the member for Westmoreland who scored not infrequently off his opponents' but his contentions being the bill was untimely and unoperative.

The Minister for Public Works took the view that the morale of the country would be benefited by the passing of the measure. He was succeeded by the member for Halifax who protested the measure was but at best but a half measure. Had the measure made the Federal House its enforcers instead of the Provinces the opposition was theirs to a man. The surprise of the evening then came, no speaker offering Mr. Speaker put the resolution. A few minutes of suspense and Mr. Speaker announced the resolution defeated.

The Premier gave notice that the resignations of his Cabinet would be in the hands of the King's representative at an early hour. Conformably, a little later Mr. McRae was sent for and invited to form a Cabinet.

After the House adjourned some most useful remarks were made by Mr. Speaker (Capt. Macdonald). It is understood that the orders of the House on Thursday will include a speech from the Throne, in fact a formal opening of the House next Monday evening.

## PUBLIC MEETING.

At a public meeting held at Cape Traverse in February 1902 to discuss the question of better transportation facilities a committee was appointed for the purpose of keeping this all important topic before the public. Now a strong sentiment prevails throughout the province that a properly equipped railway ferry between the capes is feasible and should be established to put us in closer touch with the railway system of the Dominion and thereby more fully carry out the terms of confederation.

By order of the above mentioned committee I hereby give notice that a public meeting will be held at Emerald on Monday, the 30th inst., at one o'clock, p. m., for the purpose of discussing this all important question.




