THE POTATO AS A TRUCK CROP BY L. C. CORBETT.
This bulletin gives a brief history of the potato in the introduction followed by a short sketch on the factors to be considered in deciding upon the acreage to plant in any year. The soil specially suitable for early potatoes is then treated in a very thorough manner, giving the necessary proportions.
The most valuable part of the bulletin to Island farmers now follows, that is the treatment of the seed and the subsequent fertilization and cultivation. In the paragraph on spraying, farmers will please note that mistake has probably been made where they recommend 8 ounces of Lead Arsenate to 50 gal. water. This will not apply on P. E. Island, three lbs. of lead arsenate to forty gallons being necessary here.
Harvesting, picking, packing and marketing complete the bulletin and are treated in a very thorough manner. On the whole, this is a bulletin of great value to all truck farmers that cater to the early market. It may be obtained from the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington.

Mix and sift one-third cupful of rye meal, two-thirds cupful of bread flour, and one-fourth teaspoonful of salt. Add gradually, while beating constantly, one and one-third cupful of milk and two eggs well beaten. Fill hot, buttered, iron gem pans with mixture, and bake forty minutes.

HOW A BIG DEAL WAS MADE.

How a recent ten million dollar deal in Canadian real estate was put through by a man, who, eighteen years ago, landed at Newcastle-on-Tyne with \$50.00 in his pocket is the story which George H. Cushing tells in "Financing Big Colonization" appearing in June Canada Monthly. In England he learned the ways of big business, and from a poor Danish lad, became a man of affairs in houses dealing with Canadian lands. Says Mr. Cushing: "The imagination does not have much trouble in completing that picture. England, being old, is long past the internal development stage, and, being experienced, has long ago reduced every activity to intensified specialization. English ideas are not concentrated upon 'making a million' but upon a safe and conservative investment to assure a moderate return. I could see the whole picture of it in that terse statement of his about his experience up to six years ago. He was in the specialized grind, learning the specialized routine and being imbued with the specialized viewpoint. He was getting the technique of English finance—in one branch. And, this branch headed toward Canada.
"Being born in the country and associated with farming, I became interested in western Canada land and in the land, particularly of Saskatchewan." Mr. Hansen told me. 'What I learned about land before I was twelve is more than I have learned since I was thirty—and more valuable. I knew the value of that land when I first saw it. I colonized quite a lot of it with men from England, Scotland and Holland—men who really knew good land when they saw it.'
"He stopped with that statement and I had to prod him to get him a foot further. Even then my imagination had to complete that part of the picture. This movement was almost a trick. I would say it depicted a Scotch trait, so shrewd is it.
