MONTREAL, Nov. 6.—(Special)—Dominion Park, a prominent pleasure resort, was destroyed by fire today with a loss of \$200,000.

A CARNIVOROUS TREE DESCRIBED BY EXPLORER

Mlle Lecomte Who Has Just Returned to France After a Long Expedition Through India, Tells How She Awoke One Night.

Then with maniacal cries the Indians approached and gazing this horrible liquid in wooden cups commenced to drink it, their eyes shining with ecstasy.

MANY FISHERMEN LOST IN STORM

Schooner Orion, of Grand Banks Went down and Nineteen Perished.

NORTH SYDNEY, N. S., Nov. 5.—All hope of ever seeing the Newfoundland fishing schooner Orion, with her captain and crew of eighteen souls, has been given up.

Shortly after the Orion sailed a terrible southwest gale sprung up which wrought much havoc to the fishing craft. Since then fierce gales have swept the coast and in one of them the Orion is believed to have gone down with all hands.

During the blow four vessels, lying at anchor in North Sydney harbor, had a narrow escape from going to the bottom as a result of the Nova Scotia schooner Lily, dragging her anchors, followed immediately by the Gloucester seiner Madam doing likewise.

ORION'S WRECKAGE WASHED ASHORE

St. John, Nfld., Nov. 5.—It is feared that many lives were lost in the last heavy gale. Three Newfoundland fishing schooners are missing and four French vessels belonging to the St. Pierre banking fleet have not reported.

YOUNG GIRL MASQUERADES AS FOREIGN PRINCE

The Clever Personating of a Naval Pensioner's Daughter in England.

LONDON, Nov. 5.—An extraordinary story of a naval pensioner's daughter masqueraded as an Italian prince with a pedigree dating from B. C. 900, was told at Worcestershire Quarter Sessions yesterday.

James Douglas, aged 81, a naval pensioner, and his wife and daughter were charged with obtaining goods from a number of tradesmen at Malvern by false pretences.

It was stated that the daughter passed as a wealthy Italian prince living in retirement. In communications to tradesmen, ordering goods or postponing payment, it was stated that the 'prince' had immensely valuable properties in all parts of the world, that he paid a million sterling per annum to the Vatican and that he kept fifteen grooms.

Pres. Falconer Asks For Breadth In National Life

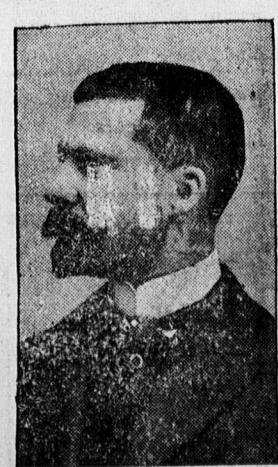
Declares Canadian Statesmen Have a Difficult Problem in Unifying the Country—There Should be no Provincialism--Weld the Races.
