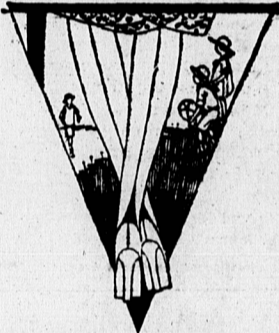

WOMEN RAISED TO EQUALITY WITH MEN

MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 2.—(By The Canadian Press)—Progress made by the people of Czechoslovakia since the kingdom was founded in 1918 was outlined by Madame Frantisek Kveton, wife of the consul-general for Czechoslovakia, in addressing the Alumnae Society of McGill University. The speaker dealt chiefly with the position of women in Czechoslovakia. Since the formation of the kingdom, women have enjoyed absolute equality with men, she declared, and read portions of the constitution which had given this equality. Women may occupy any posts, and evidence of their interest in politics and the welfare of their country had been proven by the fact that in the election preceding the last, for which the lecturer had no statistics, women had cast more votes than the men. There are women in Parliament, although they do not occupy executive positions in any great number, which Madame Kveton attributed to the fact that their emancipation was so comparatively recent. Every career is open to them she noted.

—"THE RIGHTS OF SPINSTERS" LONDON, Dec. 2.—(By The Canadian Press)—The woman's editor of "Overpass" writes of recent newspaper cuttings dealing with women: "There are any number dealing with new careers and professions for women, such as radiography, the growing of fruit and vegetables under glass, women estate managers, building managers, women demonstrators, banana growers in Australia, and I learn, too, that there now exists hundreds of women doctors in Japan. But what interested me most, perhaps, were the remarks of a Mr. R. B. Kerr, of London, who spoke on the "Rights of Spinsters" at a recent Congress. He pointed out, in the first place, the phenomenal growth in the number of spinsters in all countries since the middle of last century, and asserted that among the most educated women the majority were married. Furthermore, somewhat unexpectedly, Mr. Kerr declared that he considered the decline of marriage and the increase of spinsterhood as good, for the growth of spinsterhood had been "concurrent with the greatest growth of humanity the world had ever known."
