IN MEMORIAM

MRS. JOHN GILLESPIE. After a long and painful illness which was borne with patience which can only be shown by the one who is strong in the faith of Jesus Christ, the spirit of Mrs. John Gillespie of Clyde River, returned to God who gave it, on November the 15th, 1916. She had reached the advance age of 86 years. Many years ago she professed her faith in the Saviour of mankind and never swerved in her allegiance to the King of Kings and in her last sickness waited patiently for the summons to bid adieu to all earthly things and pass into the mansions of the Redeemed to be forever with the Lord. Her maiden name was Matilda Young. She leaves to mourn their loss an aged husband and the following children, James, in Sask., John R. in N. B., Thomas in California, Richard in the Yukon, Frank in Alaska, George and William at home and Mrs. MacKinnon, Clyde River. The funeral which was very largely attended bore endurance of the respect in which she was held by the community in which she had resided for so many years. The funeral services were conducted by the Rev. D. MacLean and the body was laid to rest in the Presbyterian Cemetery at Clyde River. "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord and henceforth; yea saith the Spirit that they may rest from their labors and their works do follow them."

OCTAVE M. GALLANT

A gloom was cast over St. Chysostome on Monday morning by the death of Octave M. Gallant which took place at his residence somewhat suddenly though he had been in failing health for the last several years. Deceased felt as usual that morning when he suddenly complained of weakness, and expired shortly after. His death at 73 removes from the parish of Egmont Bay one of the most faithful Christian parishioners. He was a man of sterling disposition and though in failing health of late years always assisted when possible, at church devotions. The same rigid regularity that governed his spiritual duties also presided at his temporal welfare, evidence of which can be seen by the splendid residence, now owned by his son Xavier, one of the most luxurious establishments of Egmont Bay. His funeral took place on Wednesday morning and was largely attended. Rev. Father Boudreault officiated at the funeral ceremonies. Rev. Father Joseph Gallant of St. Dunstan's assisted.

THE BELGIAN HOME TODAY

Such are the homes of Belgium and their ruins are symbolical of the lives of those who occupy them. Ruin here, devastation there and amidst it all the terrible hunger that drives the people towards death or insanity. What there is left of the home is the equivalent of what remains of the food supply—next to nothing. For two years the Belgian Relief Committee's unceasing efforts have provided these people with a ration less than half that of the soldier in the field. A pint of soup and three slices of bread is the allowance and daily the numbers dependent upon this are increasing. There are over seven millions of them. Many have died, more are dying, but the committee continues its efforts to save those left.
