EXECUTION OF EX CZAR OF RUSSIA

AMSTERDAM, August 1.—Given two hours in which to prepare for the end, Nicholas Romanoff, former Russian Emperor, was taken out by his executioners in a state of such collapse that it was necessary to prop him against a post, says the Lokal Anzeiger of Berlin, which claims to have received from a high Russian personage an account of the Emperor's last hours.

As he was unable to stand without support when the place of execution was reached, he was propped against a post. He raised his hands, and seemed to be trying to speak, but the rifles spoke, and he fell dead.

CHILEAN ARMY MEN OPPOSE PORT PLAN

VALPARAISO, Chile, July 31.—Chilean military circles are agitated over attempts that are being made to have the port of Valparaiso enlarged with a view to commercial accommodations which would necessitate demolishing the present plan of fortifications, designed by an American officer.

Casanova's project responds to a long-felt commercial necessity and provides for the construction of a breakwater which would shelter the entire bay. He proposes that the breakwater be constructed by convict labor and that the material be taken out of the hills that guard the bay and which are now occupied by the forts called Valdivia and Yerbas Buenas.

Supporters of the plan maintain that there would be no danger in destroying the forts, saying that Valparaiso is a purely commercial port and consequently should not be fortified, and that because of its topographical conditions it can never be made an effective military base.

FLOWERS DRIVE OUT FLIES

DEMANDS ARREST OF GERMAN LEADERS

AMSTERDAM, July 31.—A memorandum demanding ruthless action against the men at the helm of German government in 1914, as guilty criminals, has been issued by former Captain Ryon Boerfelde, says a Berlin telegram quoting the Cologne Volks Zeitung. The memorandum is entitled "a necessary correction of the German white book," and was sent to the members of the Reichstag last week by the captain who was prominent in connection with the Prince Lichnowsky affair brought about by the Prince, who was German ambassador to London in 1914, declaring that Germany was responsible for the war.

He demands the immediate arrest of former Chancellor von Bethman Hollweg and declares that if the Reichstag does not fulfill his demand the curse of this and all succeeding generations will fall upon it for cowardly neglect of duty.

In case of the Reichstag's refusal, Captain von Boerfelde declares, he will immediately request passes for himself and family to Switzerland, because he will no longer share Germany's shame and dishonor.

Man slaughter at Halifax

HALIFAX, N.S., Aug. 1.—As a result of a fight which took place on Tuesday night on the Furness Withy wharf, Donald Shaw, chief mate of the steamer Siberian Prince, lies in the cells at the police station, charged with manslaughter, and Arthur McBride, a greaser, belonging to the same steamer, is dead.

The trouble was the outcome of a dispute that has been going on for some time over the amount each of the crew of the steamer was entitled to receive on account of salvage.

Late Tuesday night, the chief engineer of the steamer, in company with the chief mate, Donald Shaw, when returning to their ship, encountered the deceased, Arthur McBride, near the head of the pier. He appeared to be in a half-drunken condition, and immediately engaged the chief in an argument over the salvage question. The chief mate was an interested spectator for a while, but finally took a hand in the argument, with the upshot that the two soon clinched and a fight took place. Just what happened does not appear to be clear, but after the men separated, the deceased appeared to be in a very weak condition and sunk to a sitting position on the wharf. His condition soon became so serious that he was carried aboard the steamer, where he later expired.

The police and Medical Officer Finn were notified and both were soon at the wharf, Chief Hanrahan being accompanied by Detective Kennedy. After investigation, the chief took into custody the chief engineer, chief mate and five members of the crew, who are being held as likely to give important evidence. The charge of manslaughter has been laid against Donald Shaw only.

IMMENSE VALUE CANADIAN FISH

OTTAWA, July 31.—An increase of \$300,000 in the total values, in first hands, of seafood landed in Canada during the month of June, as compared with the same month a year ago, is shown by the monthly statement issued from the naval department.

The value of the fish landed last month was \$3,771,107, while in June, 1917, it totalled \$3,460,999.

The department announces that the weather was not very suitable for fishing operations in the Atlantic during the greater part of the past month, and consequently such fish as cod, haddock and hake were not landed in such large quantities as in June, 1917, when conditions were better. There was a falling off of 138,000 cwts. in cod, haddock and hake, but the landings of pollock, mackerel and herring were greater by about 10,000 cwts., 6,000 cwts., and 106,000 cwts. respectively. Since the opening of the lobster season, on the 15th of November last, till the end of June, there were packed 91,588 cases, while 51,921 cases were shipped in shell. During the corresponding period last year 136,425 cases were packed and 67,315 cwts. shipped in shell.

FOCH AND FRENCH, 1914 TUBBING AS A NOVELTY IN COUNTRY SAYS DR. MUEHLON

It was 2 o'clock in the morning of Nov. 1, that Foch met French when the tide of battle was running strongly against us. It was suggested, for the sake of prudence, that the British should retire. The development of the suggestion was scattered by Foch's interruption, uttered in those stirring machine-gun-like sentences of which I know so well. This is what he said:—

"The Germans have sixteen corps. Very well. We have only ten, with yours. If you retire I shall remain. Remain! The British army never drew back in its history. As for myself, I give you my word as a soldier that I will die rather than retreat. Give me yours!" The soldiers around him listened in silence. It was Lord French who stepped forward and grasped Foch firmly by the hand. In that handshake the doom of the Germans at Ypres was sealed. Cleveland Leader.
