### DOUBLE CRIME IN PORT COQUITLAM

VANCOUVER, Oct. 8.—Ranking among the standing mysteries in the police annals of British Columbia is the double murder of Albert Witchery and his wife in their home at Port Coquitlam, 20 miles from here. It occurred 10 years ago.

Not the slightest clue to the identity of the slayer has been found. No plausible motive has ever been brought out and no arrest made.

The Witcherys were found dead in their home on a Saturday night, March 22, 1924—the wife with her head smashed by repeated blows from a sledge hammer and the husband shot through the face and chest with a shotgun.

Investigating officers uncovered one startling fact but it only added to their bafflement. The slayer returned to the scene next day and locked the back door. He then disappeared completely.

Witchery was a railway car inspector. Early on the Friday evening he left his home to do some carpentering for a women's charitable organization. About 9.30 a neighbor thought she heard a scream. Looking out she saw a man come out of the back door of the Witchery house and walk toward the woods. She thought it was the husband. Subsequent testimony by people working with him at the time proved it could not have been Witchery.

Half an hour later the neighbor heard what she thought to be a shot. She put it down to boys using air rifles.

Next morning the baker's boy called. His evidence was no one answered his knock and he tried the door. It was unlocked and opening it a little he saw the gun on the table. He left a loaf of bread between the inner and outer kitchen doors.

When neighbors started an investigation Saturday evening they found the doors locked and the lights burning. The body of Mrs. Witchery was lying on the floor of the hall, partially covered with old clothes. The husband was on the floor of the kitchen, dead from gunshot wounds.

Reconstructing the crime police deduced the slayer had entered the house with a sledge hammer, beaten Mrs. Witchery to death then waited for the husband's return later in the evening and shot him as he entered the kitchen.

### NOVA SCOTIA EGG LAYING CONTEST EXPERIMENTAL FARM, NAFFAN, N. S.

At the close of the 12th four-weekly period, the birds in the Nova Scotia Contest at the Nappan Experimental Farm have laid a total of 37,292 eggs, with an average of 38,385.5 points since the commencement of the contest.

The leading pen to date is Mr. K. W. Smith's pen of Barred Plymouth Rocks from Prince William, N. B., with a production of 2,176 eggs and 2,312.5 points. Mrs. George Waterston's pen of Barred Plymouth Rocks from Sussex Corner, N. B. is second, with 2,163 eggs and 2,239.1 points while Mr. G. S. Taylor's pen of single Comb white Leghorns from Bloomfield, One is third, with 2,007 eggs and 2,190 points.

The leading individual to date is Mr. R. D. Thexton's Rhode Island Red No. 18 from Oxford, N. S., with a production of 267 eggs scoring 292.4 points. Mr. K. W. Smith's Barred Plymouth Rock No. 109, from Prince William, N. B. is second, with 264 eggs and 288.3 points, while Mr. G. S. Taylor's White Leghorn No. 200, from Bloomfield, is third, with 251 eggs and 286.1 points.

### PAPER SLEEVES MAKE HIT WITH WOMEN OF NANCHUNG, CHINA

SHANGHAI, China, Oct. 9.—Authorities of the city of Nanchung, where Chiang Kaishek maintains his headquarters, have adopted a new fashion of enforcing the ruling that women must wear long sleeves when appearing in public.

The first "skirmish" with the authorities resulted in a victory for the ladies. Those appearing in public in short sleeves preferred to pay fines rather than change their dresses. The police, however, caused a number of paper sleeves to be made in various colors and designs and women arrested in short sleeves were given a pair of these overcoats in the same color and design as their dresses. They were supposed to pin the paper sleeves to their dresses.

This new idea seemed to catch the fancy of the women of Nanchung, for the police soon found the habit of presenting anyone and everyone in short sleeves with a paper pair was a costly procedure.

### RELIEVE OVERCROWDING

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Oct. 8.—To relieve overcrowding in His Majesty's penitentiary, 21 prisoners will be sent out in a gang to dig ditches and cut shrubs along the government's railway line.

### ROYAL BABY'S BAPTISM IS POSTPONED

ROME, Oct. 9.—The baptism of the baby Princess Maria Pia, first born infant of the Crown Prince, Umberto and Princess Maria Jose, has been postponed from October 18 to early in December, the newspaper Popolo Di Rome reported today.

The postponement was prompted by a desire to await King Victor Emmanuel's return from Italian Somaliland, East Africa.

### WORKS RETRIEVE QUANT VILLAGE

LONDON, Oct. 8.—An ideal village has been restored and a beauty spot established at London's door. This has come about through a trust company purchasing from the Royal Society of Arts, West Wycombe, Buckinghamshire. As a slacker 80 members of the company visited the village of West Wycombe and had tea in a room which before renovation was the village slaughter house.

Five years ago the greater part of the village had been condemned. Notice of repair had been served on the owners of 50 cottages and the village was in danger.
