In many places through the country on Saturday the snow fell to a depth of two feet and people travelling by wagon found it difficult to proceed. Sleighs were used by many people who had to do travelling by road on that day.

Peter P. Gillis, convicted for a fourth offence under the Prohibition Law, and whose application for a certiorari to quash the conviction was recently refused by the Supreme Court, last evening gave himself up to the officers of the law and was taken to jail to serve his sentence.

A party of young men and women who arrived from Pictou on Saturday, yesterday went down to Georgetown to "dem nstrate" the fashion of smoking herring. These people are experienced at the business and come for the purpose of showing local employes of the Georgetown establishment how to cure the fish.

The S.S. Minia took up the P. E. Island end of the submarine cable last night about 10 o'clock. The cable is broken half way between Cape Traverse and the mainland. Messages were sent to Charlottetown last night by Mr. Morrison of the Anglo American Tel. Co., by means of the severed cable, which had been brought aboard the Minia.

The Milford Times, of Milford, Oakland County, Michigan, of the 4th inst., contains particulars of the death of Rev. Frederick Strong, formerly of this Province. It appears that he was struck by apoplexy on May 3rd. He arose early that day and busied himself about his home. He attended to some work in the yard and not coming into the house his wife went to find him. She discovered his dead body, and there was every evidence to show that death had come very suddenly. Mr. Strong served a long and honorable ministry in the Methodist Church, and his death is sincerely mourned by his friends and neighbors. His wife is a daughter of the late Hon. Wm. Douse, of Charlottetown.

HORSE NOTES.

A colt from "Goldfinder" was raised by Mr. Ackland, Hampshire, and sold to J. Yee for \$300, who resold him at the last exhibition for \$350 to Mr. Gallant, Blcomfield. R. Siliphant, Hunter River, has bought this animal from Mr. Gallant for the handsome sum of \$425, and is going to ship him to Nova Scotia. The horse is only two years and eleven months old. Mr. Andrew, New Glasgow, owner of "Goldfinder" should certainly feel proud of such splendid stock, also the following horses bred by "Parkside Jr." who have brought excellent prices: "Parker L" raised by J. Livingston, New Dominion, sold to Jos. Crabbe, City, and again sold to R. J. Ramsay, Summerside, for the handsome sum of \$475. This horse is said to have gone halves in 1.03, 1.00, 1.07 and doing the mile in 2.10, his race record being 2.20. Geo. Hardy, Pleasant Grove, raised a Parkside Jr. that brought \$300. Alex. McDonald, Nine Mile Creek, also sold a horse for \$250. Murdoch McL. an, New Argyle, raised a mare that was sold to the Governor of Newfoundland for \$300. Artemus Clow, North Wiltshire, also sold a horse for \$250. This animal was raised by Mr. McDougall, West River. Thomas Curtis, East Royalty, won his prize last fall with his Parkside foal against an entry of thirteen.

Private advices state that Mrs. E. H. Norton, of Loveland, Colorado formerly of Charlottetown, accompanied by her daughter Grace, is now on her way to England and will spend the summer at her old home in Swansea, Wales. She sails by the steamship Ottawa from Montreal.

Notwithstanding the almost disagreeable weather, muddy crossings and sloppy footways enough people turned out last evening to fairly fill the Opera House, drawn thither by the attraction of the engaging pastoral play Snug Harbor, which was to be presented for the first time in this city. They were rewarded by two and a half hours of rare entertainment. The story in brief is one of two families of fisher folk in Gloucester Mass. There are but nine persons in the cast, including two old sea dogs of sixty, Captains D in Dawson and Amos Langton, Becky, the sister of Capt. Dan, Mrs. Langton, the wife of Capt. Amos, their daughter Helen, Homer Baxter, a protégée of Capt. Dan, and in love with Helen, Urish Crump, who describes himself as having "more brains and more money than any man in Snug Harbor" and two servants, a Capt. Dan, Jasper being colored and Sammy of small stature and a great tease. The play centers in the trials and fidelity of the two lovers, and the machinations of Urish Crump, who is the villain of the play, bent on marrying Helen, in which he is aided and abetted by the stern parent, Capt. Amos. The scenes are laid first in the store and later in the home of Capt. Dan. And in the end love triumphs, the villain is confounded, and every body else is happy. It is a clean and wholesome play, with abundant dramatic interest for persons of cultivated taste. Mr. Horton presented with rare felicity the worthy character of Capt. Dan Dawson—a finished piece of work. Miss Hardenburg very prettily presented the changing emotions aroused in varied and trying situations and quite won all hearts. Mr. Williams as Capt. Amos Langton, the obdurate parent, and Mr. Rowland as Urish Crump left nothing to be desired. Miss Eva Benton as Becky Dawson, the worried, over-worked maiden sister, with many cares, troubles and physical ailments, was an admirable impersonation. Miss Emma Chase, as Mrs. Langton, had less to do but did it well. Mr. Jennings as Mr. Taylor as Sammy Smart created vast amusement in their comical sayings and doings, and in song and dance specialties between acts. Snug Harbor will be repeated tonight and will undoubtedly attract a full house from among the many citizens who delight in fun and wholesome drama unmixd with vulgarity, or anything that can offend refined tastes.
