Work Begins On Runways At S'ide Airport

Preparatory work has already been commenced by Curran and Briggs Ltd. in connection with the contract they have been given to reconstruct and extend the runways at the Summerside Airport. This contract said to amount to about a million and a quarter dollars is a huge job and will take two years to complete. Approximately 160 men will be given employment during the first three months but in the later stages of the contract this will be reduced by about half as a greater proportion of the work will be done by machines.

Officials of the company state that they expect no difficulty in filling all the jobs from men resident in this Province as they have a large file of applications already. This might indicate that there is more unemployment on the island than the official figures indicate.

The work will consist of laying a new coat of asphalt over all the existing runways and taxi ways and the extension of one runway by 1,000 feet and another by 640 feet. This will give the Summerside Airport two runways of 6,000 feet and one of 5,000 feet. Three concrete buttons will also be laid. These are strips of concrete 200 feet in length, the width of the runway. The necessity for these concrete buttons is because the new jet planes generate so much heat on taking off that it would melt asphalt.—S.

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Annual Meeting Of West Prince Conservatives

Mr. Clarence Morrissey, Tignish, was elected president of the West Prince Progressive Conservative Association at the annual meeting of the Association on Wednesday afternoon. Mr. George Matthews, retiring president occupied the chair. Other officers elected were: Vice President, Mrs. Alfred Gillis, Alberton; secretary, Mr. J. B. Morrissey, Tignish.

District Vice Presidents: 1st District, Mrs. Alfred Gillis; 2nd District, Earle Ellis; 3rd District, John F. Arsenault.

Names of the poll chairmen for the three districts will be announced later.

Mr. Matthews, in his presidential report, urged that he be retired in view of the fact that he had filled the position for many years. What was needed, he emphasized, was younger blood in the party ranks.

Present at the meeting was Mr. Foley, of Alberton, last surviving member of the original West Prince Conservative Association which was formed fifty-four years ago. Mr. Foley, who has voted Conservative continuously for the past sixty-five years, gave a brief address and was very warmly applauded.

Other local speakers were Messrs. Clarence Morrissey, J. W. D. Campbell, Allie MacNeill, Patrick Callaghan, Sanford Phillips, and Foster Sharpe.

Other Speakers

Mr. D. L. Mathieson, M.L.A., in the absence of the Provincial leader Hon. Dr. MacMillan, who is out of the Province, addressed the meeting on Party policy and other matters.

The meeting was privileged to hear Miss Hilda Hessen, president of the Women's Progressive Conservative Association of Canada, in a lengthy address portraying the necessity of getting the women of the party to take an active interest in politics, as they constitute fifty percent of the population. In the latter part of her address she reviewed the career of Hon. John Bracken from the time he was a farm boy to his present position as leader of the Party in Canada.

She emphasized that the only solution for the farmer, fisherman and small wage earner would be the election of Mr. Bracken and a Federal Government composed of his followers.

Brief remarks were made by Mr. Reginald Bagnall, president of the Provincial organization, who was making his first visit to O'Leary in his official capacity.

Mr. Joseph R. MacMillan, Provincial secretary, spoke with reference to the organization plans of the Provincial executive which are now being drawn up for a complete coverage of every poll in Prince Edward Island.

A hearty vote of thanks was passed unanimously to the retiring president and executive.

Resolutions were passed reaffirming confidence in the leadership of Hon. Mr. Bracken and Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan; supporting Mr. McLure, M.P., in his condemnation of the P. E. I. Liberal colleagues in Parliament on their failure to take a stand against the freight rates judgment adversely affecting P.E.I. interests; and calling upon the Island representatives at Ottawa to see that in the supplementary estimates sufficient money is granted for the West Point car ferry.
