TWO RECORDS BROKEN AT MARITIME CHAMPIONSHIPS

Andrew Malcolm Stretches The 16-lb Shot Record to 43 Feet 3 1-4 Inches And Phil McDonald Lowers the Hurdle Record to 15 3-5 Seconds. Abegweits Top The List With 47 Points, Antigonish Second With 25 And Trojans, St. John, Third With 18 Points. Phil McDonald Highest Point Getter of The Meet With 21.

The Maritime Championships held yesterday afternoon at the Abegweit grounds passed off successfully. The day broke good, but shortly after the events got under way a heavy north wind sprang up which handicapped the track events somewhat.

The track was never in better condition for fast time and fast time was made in all the events. Had the competition been a little keener in the half mile and five miles, three more records would have passed into history; as it was the time passed for good.

Some of the most unexpected for a championship meet was the attendance, only a fair number turning out, but those that did were generous in their applause for the performance of the different athletes as they performed in the events to bring the trophy to the club and city they represented.

The sports were held under the distinguished patronage of Lt. Governor Hearty, who with Mrs. Hearty and daughter Miss Ruth, Col. Hooper, Miss Stewart and Miss Gill, occupied the decorated box seat on the grand stand.

Dog Distemper To Be Feared

Dr. J. A. Allen, of the Fox Research Station, states that from information that he has received and from his own personal observation there is an indication, more or less, of an outbreak of distemper among the dogs in Charlottetown.

Dr. Allen states that this disease kills about 40 percent of dogs, according to history. He is concerned chiefly in warning fox ranchers to be on their guard, as this distemper is transmissible to foxes. When it gets hold of fox ranches the disease may account for about 70 per cent of the young stock.

According to Dr. Allen fox ranchers should see that no stray dogs are allowed near a ranch. All dogs on a ranch should not be permitted to come in contact with other animals. In other words the ranch dog should be protected as carefully as the foxes in any ranch.

Ranch workers or ranchers having dogs at home should not come in contact with them as they are liable to carry the disease to the ranch, even when the dog is in the incipient stages of the disease and do not show any symptoms of distemper.

Distemper has always been the scourge of the canine race, and it behooves fox ranchers of Prince Edward Island to be on their guard against it.

Dr. Allen also states that no cases of distemper have been reported in the last four years, but there is a possibility of the disease becoming contagious.

There have been several cases of distemper located in the town as well as in the country districts, and it has been suggested that some method of quarantine be adopted as a preventative measure in order to protect the progress of the health of the fox industry of the island.

The symptoms of dog distemper in brief are as follows: A dog is usually full of life and rump around. Instead he becomes languid and seeks warmth, even on hot days. He may be noticed to shiver and his temperature elevated to approximately 104 to 106 degrees.

Usually the eyes become sore, with pus forming in the corners; the bowels may become loose showing a distinct diarrhea. In a few days the dog gets weak and becomes so fatigued that he cannot stand on his feet.

THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, August 26.—The demand for Manitoba spring union steady today from both foreign and American sources. The volume of business was small on account of the light offerings. There was a slight improvement in the demand for cash grain and little specific business was transacted including sales of No. 2 Canadian Western oats, at 17 1/2 cents per bushel over October Winnipeg option, c.f.f. Montreal. In sympathy with the further weakness in the Winnipeg option market for oats and little specific business was transacted in Montreal were reduced another half cent per bushel.

Little business was done in the flour market but prices were well maintained. The mill feed market was quiet and firm the market for standard quality reports a slight improvement in egg receipts with quality good extras 32, firsts 25, seconds 26. Supply is not yet sufficient to meet demand. Vancouver local fresh laid steady. Dealers are paying country points extra 35, firsts 37. Halifax egg prices at country points are unchanged but wholesale prices were much easier with extras 42, firsts 38, and retailing extras 50, firsts 45.

Dempsey Defies Boxing Commission

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 26.—Jack Dempsey has advised Harry Willis to disregard the New York Boxing Commission threats of banishment and "sit tight" on the agreement for the Willie-Dempsey battle under the promotion of Floyd Fitzsimmons, of Indiana. In a telephone conversation with Paddy Mullins, manager for Willis, at New York Dempsey was informed that the N. Y. Commission threatened to ban Willis unless he put up a forfeit to match the forfeit posted by Jack Kearns, Dempsey's former manager, for a match to be promoted by Tex Rickard.

His Word of Honor. The champion assured Mullins that banishment by the New York Commission would not do him harm, that the important thing to remember was that "you have my word of honor that I will fight Willis next year."

Later Dempsey despatched a telegram confirming the telephone conversation and promising Mullins that he "would insist that the Fitzsimmons people arrange a meeting quickly to post money," guaranteeing the proposed Willis-Dempsey match somewhere in the Middle West next July 4.

Train Bandits At Work

SANTA ANNA, Calif., Aug. 26.—A combination express and mail car was robbed and the messenger in charge shot and beaten last night when bandits boarded a Santa Fe train between San Diego and Santa Anna. The value of the loot has not been determined.

It is believed that four men participated in the robbery which was not discovered until the train reached Santa Anna and the messenger, Elmer Campbell, found unconscious on the floor of the car, which was in great disorder. Letters and packages were strewn about and mail sacks cut open.

Apparently the robbers had climbed to the top of the car and shot Campbell through a ventilator, breaking in through a door when he fell probably fatally wounded. The robbers are believed to have boarded the train when it stopped at Oceanside and to have left San Juan Capistrano, about thirty miles from here. The train left San Diego with nine pouches of mail, including one pouch of airplane mail. A check-up showed only six packages had been left behind and the airplane pouch was among the missing. The pouch remained in the car had been slit open and their contents explored. While there was no registered mail the contents of the airplane pouch was believed to be of great value.
