In regard to the puncturing of the tire of George Prowse's bicycle during the road race of Wednesday evening last, The Guardian is informed that the mishap occurred at Milton, instead of at North River, as stated in yesterday's Guardian. Mr. Prowse, it will thus be seen, before he had to finally abandon the race, at Douse's Bridge, on account of the roughness of the North River Road, had ridden a good many miles with a punctured tire. His pluck certainly deserved to be better rewarded.

The Moncton Times says—Rev. J. M. Forbes, Mrs. Forbes and two daughters, of Cleveland, Ohio, crossed Wednesday from P. E. Island where they have been spending their vacation. Mr. Forbes, previous to going to Cleveland was located in Alberton. During his stay on the Island he drove over the greater part of the province. He reports the crops there looking well; indeed the prospect is that the harvest will be one of the best in the history of the Island. Mr. Forbes and family left yesterday afternoon for Cleveland, via Montreal and Toronto.

Herrick's Text-Book in General Zoology By Glenn W. Herrick, B. S. A., Professor of Biology in the Mississippi Agricultural and Mechanical College.—In this book, a branch of the animal kingdom is introduced by a familiar and accessible type. The discussion of this type expresses in an organized form, the details of the work already supposed to have been done in the laboratory and field and brings out the characteristics of the branch of which the type is an example. After the various forms of the branch have been studied, their characteristics are summed up, their adaptations to environment and their economic significance are discussed, and lastly, a clear, concise classification of the group is given. The book is suited for use in any secondary school, and meets fully the requirements of the New York State Education Department's course in zoology. It will create an interest in nature, train the powers of observation, and give a good acquaintance with the lives, habits, and activities of animals. Cloth, 12mo., 288 pages. Price, \$1.20. An Islander at home, writes from King's County saying that notwithstanding former protests the press is publishing the athletic exploits of Islanders abroad like W. Halpenney and neglecting to note the performances of athletes at home. He draws attention to the fact that Halpenney's excellent running long leap of nineteen and a half feet was eclipsed by the feat of John MacPherson who at the Caledonian sports at Georgetown recently covered twenty-one feet in the running long leap. This correspondent says the local press did the Scottish athletes an injustice by stating that the eastern hammer-thrower MacCormack and MacLean threw the light hammer a distance of 87 and 86 feet, whereas that performance was made with the 16-lb. hammer. Also John MacPherson is credited with putting the light shot a distance of 34 feet, whereas this was the sixteen pounder and his throw breaks the Island record. The skillful work of Campbell, Dan MacPherson and Vernon Shaw might also be mentioned—the latter was handicapped by a sprained ankle—and the wonderful Johnson boy from Valleyfield, as well as others.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 5 and 21, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, acre, more or less. Entry must be made, personally at the local office for the district in which the land is situated. The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years. (2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father (or mother). (3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent. Deputy of the Interior.
