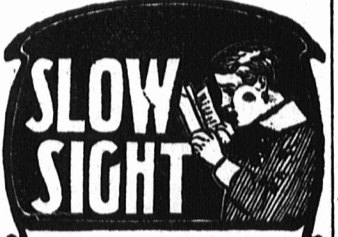

### REGINA PREPARING TO CELEBRATE.

It is yet some weeks to Dominion Day but the coming anniversary, means more in the Northwest than here from the fact that this year is with them the first year of "autonomy," which is to begin on July 1st. (We lost our autonomy on the same day of the same month thirty-two years ago, but that is another story.) To Regina, the erstwhile capital of all the Territories proposes to celebrate the anniversary with great pomp and circumstance. The original plan included a morning parade of all the schools, bearing banners and singing patriotic songs, followed by a procession of floats representing the trades and business of the city and country, then a military review, sports, Indian pony races, and in the evening a big band concert and fireworks. There was also a joint religious service proposed to be held in the Skating Rink all to sink their denominational differences and unite in worship together. But this had afterwards to be declared "off."

A committee was appointed to arrange for the religious service. This committee included members of all religious bodies in Regina excepting the Salvation Army. This committee agreed that two addresses should be delivered at the religious celebration, one by the Archbishop of Rupert's Land, (Anglican) and the other by the Archbishop of St. Boniface, (Roman Catholic). There were to be banquets by mixed choirs, prayers from the Methodist, Presbyterian and Baptist pastors, while other ministers from Calgary, Okotoka, Red Deer, Prince Albert, Saskatoon and Moosejaw were to be ranged round in an outer circle to make an imposing array of religious dignitaries. It was on the report of the committee that the trouble began. The Salvation Army naturally did not like being left out of the program. Some others thought that the Bishops, Anglican and Catholic were made too prominent. Discussion arose which was of a dividing rather than of a uniting character and continued till midnight. It was then found impossible to agree and the religious feature was abandoned. Regina will therefore celebrate Dominion Day in purely secular fashion.

### AT THE POLICE COURT.

The first Prohibition case called was that proffered by Robert Jenkins against Mrs. Angus McDonald, adjourned from a week ago. W. A. Weeks, Jr. appeared for defendant. The first witness called was Fred McDonald but the officers said he had not been served. Arthur Kenny, employed with defendant testified that he delivered parcels from Angus McDonald to the Railway, to the Royal Hotel, kept by Margaret McKinnon and a cask to Wm. Larner. He also delivered cases but did not know what were in them. He admitted having delivered liquor to Wm. Larner but said he was not employed by Mrs. McDonald, but by Fred McDonald, her son. Since the latter went away he was working for Mrs. McDonald around the market. He never got any instructions in any way, he said, from Mrs. McDonald.

Newton McDonald had been delivering parcels for Fred McDonald. He had never been paid or got drinks since April 2nd, the time embraced by this case.

John Cronin was in the employ of Mrs. McDonald and had delivered liquor from the office on different occasions. He had never received any instructions from Mrs. McDonald for the sale of liquor. The cheques issued in the business are signed by both Mary McDonald and Fred McDonald. Mary McDonald rose his pay after her husband died. Mary McDonald has not been at the saloon since April 2nd. He had never seen defendant personally sign cheques.

The magistrate in giving judgment said in a recent trial the onus had been put upon Mary McDonald and now it is put on Fred McDonald. This cannot go on for ever. There is evidence of a sale and as Mary McDonald is administratrix she is responsible. The defendant was therefore convicted and fined \$100 and costs.

The next case was John R. Edwards against Mary Jane McMillan for third offence. A. J. B. Mellish appeared for the defendant.

A number of witnesses were examined but none gave convicting evidence and the case was dismissed.

Next was that of John R. Edwards against Fred Moore. A. J. B. Mellish appeared for defendant.

This case was also dismissed.

At the afternoon session the case against Charles Collings resulted in a conviction and the one against Edward Collings was adjourned for a week. Both were on prosecution of John R. Edwards.

Mrs. Angus McDonald paid her fine of \$100 and costs.

There are also a number of cases for Monday including the seizures which have been made at Mahar's and O'Brien's.

Frank Power drunk and incapable was fined \$10 or 60 days. Examined as to where he got the liquor he swore he had found it in his own house on the table in the morning.

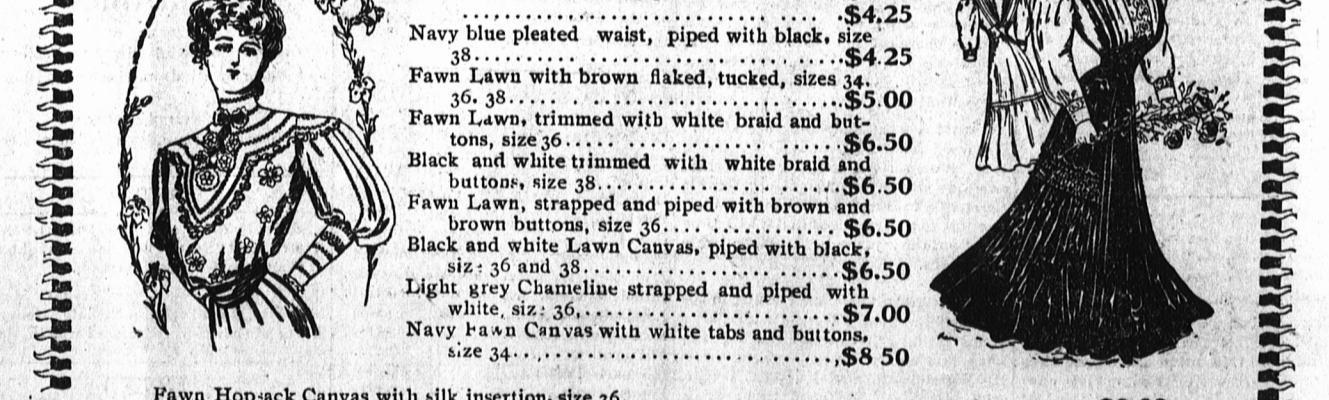

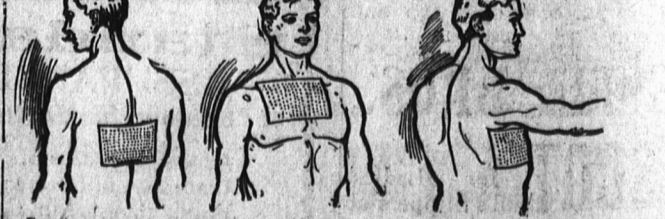
