

PREMIER BORDEN IN QUEEN CITY

Premier Escorted to Hall by Torchlight Procession and Cheered by Thousands Along the Streets.

Ten Thousand People Crowd Arena to Acclaim Conservative Leader.

Brilliant Speeches by Premier, Sir James Whitney, Mr. Hazen and Mr. Pelletier.

(Special to The Guardian.) TORONTO, May 19.—The procession and demonstration in connection with the visit of the Right Hon. J. L. Borden, Prime Minister, eclipsed any political celebration that has ever taken place in Canada.

ARENA, Toronto, May 19.—Premier Borden received a royal welcome in Toronto to-night and ten thousand people packed the large arena and acclaimed the principles of the Conservative party which were enunciated in a brilliant speech by the man who had fought so doggedly and patiently for them during the past months.

LONDON, May 18.—Although prominent officials of the home office have repeatedly urged Reginald McKenna, the home secretary, to use troops to stop the suffragettes' campaign there is no probability that he will do so. Mr. McKenna, unlike Winston Churchill, who, when home secretary, employed soldiers in Sydney street, entirely disapproves of calling out the military forces except in the most dangerous emergencies.

TEMPERANCE CAMPAIGN
