Club To Bury Former Player Who Died Broke

(By The Associated Press) CHICAGO, March 17—Chicago White Sox, the club for which he once was a \$123,000 shortstop, today arranged funeral services for Chalmers (Bill) Cissell, who died broke at 46 early today.

Death from a heart condition came to Cissell at Mercy Hospital where he had been sent by the White Sox in the middle of January.

A wake will be held here tomorrow and the body sent to St. Louis Thursday for burial.

Cissell, who gradually slumped to obscurity after being purchased by the Sox in 1927, two months ago was discovered destitute and ill from inflammation of nerves in his legs and feet.

He was barely able to move about in the one-room living quarters he shared with his 13-year-old son, Gary. The only money the pair had was \$7 a week Gary earned as a delivery boy.

The Sox bought Cissell from Portland of the Pacific Coast League for \$75,000 cash and \$48,000 in players. Known as the "Spider", Cissell played shortstop for the Sox for four seasons. He lost his job to Luke Appling during the 1941 season and next year was traded to Cleveland. Appling still is the Sox shortstop.

After stints with the New York Giants, Baltimore and Hollywood, Cissell dropped out of baseball.

"I'll moider de bums," he observed. His manager, Willie (The Beard) Gillenberg, seconded the motion. "You know," he confided, "Tony's been hurt more wrestling than he ever was when he was boxing."

Two-Ton Tony marked his 39th birthday Saturday, but he argued that he is "as good today as I ever was."

"Anyhow," he demanded, "Who are these guys in line for the title today? They're all guys fighting when I was." All that is, except Ezzard Charles, who Galento tags as "a light heavy, anyhow."

"I'll fight anybody," said Galento—provided it pays. "Waloot—Leshvich—Savold ??? Today, tomorrow or anytime," stormed the orange bear barrel.

"They try to laugh Galento off," declared The Beard, "but nobody will fight him." Galento's farthest advance on the high road to the heavyweight crown was when he fought Joe Louis in 1939. He lost in the fourth, when referee Arthur Donovan stopped the fight. Galento's eyes were badly cut.

"But he was just out of bed with pneumonia," said Willie. "And, anyhow, them handies didn't handle the cuts right."
