EXCURSION AT BRIDGETOWN.—One of the most exciting trips ever taken on the Grand River was that on Saturday afternoon, in which a number of ladies and gentlemen participated on the invitation of J. G. McLeod, Esq., the popular agent for the N. A. Assurance Co. The company boarded the steam-yacht owned by Capt. Knight of Souris, and started from Brightown wharf about three o'clock upon a trip which everyone on board will remember for years to come. The wind being favorable and the water perfectly smooth the speedy little craft conveyed the tourists to Annandale wharf, a distance of eight miles in one hour. Needless to say the company enjoyed very much the beautiful sail down to Annandale, where they were met by a number of the good folk of that lively little village, and a picnic was held on the beach. After several kinds of amusement were indulged in and the visitors all served with lunch, the pleasure seekers again embarked for the return trip. Cheers were given on board the yacht for the good people of Annandale, while those on shore gave three hearty cheers for their distinguished visitors. By the time the yacht got fairly underway, the shades of night were falling and the captain not being familiar with the winding channel of the river, gave full charge of the ship to Messrs. H. McDonald and D. McKay, who acted as engineer and wheelman on this memorable occasion. These gentlemen expressed themselves as being quite competent to steer the ship safely to port under any circumstance; shortly after night drew its dark curtain over the water, the yacht ran aground on one of those dangerous sand-bars for which this river is noted, striking with such force that Mr. McLeod and a young lady who were sitting in the stern of the boat were thrown overboard; but as the water was only a few inches in depth they escaped with a slight wetting. The engineer and wheelman bravely jumped out and did their best endeavors to get the boat off the bar, but without success. It was plainly evident to all on board that something more than human strength was necessary to float the ship. A flag of distress was then raised in the hope of signalling some boats, which were engaged in hake-fishing further down the river, but the night being dark no assistance arrived from that quarter. It now dawned upon the minds of all that they would have to remain where they were for the night; so they began to make themselves as comfortable as the circumstances of the case would permit. The moon had risen by this time and by shedding her bright light on the water, endeavored to cheer the hearts of the melancholy mariners. Somebody suggested story-telling to while away the leaden-footed hours, but before they agreed on who should start first, for the majority of them were in no pleasant mood for such work, who should appear on the scene but Mr. Andrew Lepere, the pilot, who heard the continued whistles of the boat and knowing something must be the matter put out in his boat and came to their rescue. The tide was now rising rapidly, and after a little skillful tact on his part the ship was floated once more, to the great joy of all on board, and arrived in port in good time for all hands to enjoy a sweeter night's repose than they would otherwise have spent had they remained stranded on the flats of Grand River all night.—Com.

Mrs. H. V. Palmer will take passage by the S. S. Loyalist sailing from Halifax for London on Sept. 12th. The Loyalist is a sister ship of the Evangeline which made the trip from London to Halifax in nine days and 22 hours. The Halifax Echo in referring to the passage says:—

The steamer Evangeline of the Furness Line arrived here on Sunday from London after a smart passage having accomplished the distance in nine days and twenty-two hours, notwithstanding a heavy gale on the 18th and head winds.
