The Isle of Skye, said Mr. MacDonald, is situated on the north west corner of Scotland. It is separated from the mainland of Inverness County by a narrow strait called Kyle of Lochalsh.

The Coolin Hills in the South of Skye dominate the whole landscape. No matter which part of Skye one is travelling in he is always in sight of the Coolins if the day is clear.

In leaving the Kilt Rock one travels due North again for four miles where one comes to the famous Quirang which again lifts its lofty head to the sky.

Leaving the Quirang one again travels due north until he comes to what is perhaps the most historic place in the whole island namely, the Dunluin Castle, now in ruins but which used to be the chief seat of the MacDonalds of the Isles.

For those who want to view Skye from the water it is advisable to go by the daily steamer. Sailing through the strait along the coast of Skye is an experience that will not readily be forgotten.

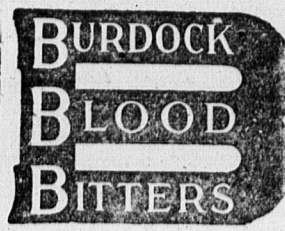

LIGHTNING SEEN--While snow was falling, driven by high wind from the south-east, Saturday evening about 8 o'clock several brilliant flashes of lightning were seen by a large number of people. The occurrence is an unusual one.

FLUE FIRE--The firemen were called shortly before 11 o'clock Saturday night to extinguish a flue fire on Upper Hillboro Street. The equipment was out only a few minutes. There was no damage.

HIGH WIND--About dawn Saturday morning the wind attained an average velocity of forty miles an hour. Gusts registered as high as fifty-five or sixty miles an hour. No damage is reported, as the wind was unaccompanied by sleet.

FERRY CROSSING--The car ferry was able to make its crossing from Tormentine to Borden Saturday afternoon in one hour and fourteen minutes. The steamer docked about 5.30, and the train arrived in Charlottetown about 8.30. Much of the ice blockade between the capes was driven westward by the wind, and the ferry crossing was thus made much easier.

Grading Increases Demand

"In many respects the Christmas turkey deal this year was unique," states the Egg and Poultry Market Review issued by the Poultry Division of the Dominion Live Stock Branch. "It marked the first time that large quantities of turkeys were offered in most principal cities not only graded but with each bird individually tagged according to grade. The reaction of retailers and consumers to the individual tagging appears to have been very favourable and as a result of steadily increasing growth in this method of identifying quality may be looked forward to."
