

Councillor Kennedy's Appeal As Mayorality Candidate

Ladies and Gentlemen: As my announcement for the Mayorality has already appeared in the Press, in making my appeal for your kind consideration I am fully convinced that the financial position of our City is excellent.

The Chartered Accountant, Mr. Hart, has surely set at rest any "Unjust Criticism." The public look upon our Bonds as a high class investment and they are eagerly sought after.

With eight years experience at the Council Board I would consider it very unwise to attempt under present conditions to embark on any "Radical Change", whereby the citizens might be called upon to suffer a great deal of hardship and the City be the loser in the end.

True the burning question is "Unpaid Taxes". Now that a general improvement is in evidence, so much so that the 1933 Tax Collections exceeded those of 1932 by practically \$11,000, we can therefore look forward with renewed faith and courage, and be assured that this matter will adjust itself satisfactorily.

If the Citizens see fit to elect me, it is my intention to co-operate with the Incoming Council in the collection of all Taxes and Arrears. With economy practised in every department of our public service I can assure the Taxpayers that the present 2 per cent rate will enable us to carry on in a satisfactory way.

Everything pertaining to the City's welfare, consistent with our revenue, will receive my approval and support.

As it will be impossible for me to make a personal canvass owing to the limited time at my disposal, I take this opportunity of soliciting your support.

Ladies and Gentlemen: Yielding to numerous requests, I have decided to offer as a Candidate in the forthcoming Civic Election. In doing so I am actuated solely by a sincere desire to be of service to the community. If you think my presence at the Council Board will be of any benefit to the deliberations of that body, I would sincerely appreciate your support.

May I say that I realize fully the absolute necessity for the most rigid economy in Civic Government, with the desired objective of a balanced budget. I do not believe there is any necessity to resort to increased taxation, and am firmly of the opinion that a plan can be evolved whereby a much greater percentage of the taxes can be collected. I would suggest four equal payments on dates to synchronize with the payment of water taxes. It would appear to me that this would serve the two-fold purpose of making it a much easier matter for citizens to pay their taxes, and would produce the revenue when required, thus reducing interest payments on borrowed money. I have sufficient faith in the citizens of this City to believe that they realize the obligations resting upon them, and are willing and anxious to fulfill their monetary obligations if the way is made easier for them.

May I say also that if elected, I will in every way endeavor to work in harmony with the Mayor, (whoever he may be) and with my fellow Councillors towards the building up of a bigger, better and more prosperous City. The problems are many and difficult. Most careful consideration and complete cooperation is essential; but with a united Council, working in peace and harmony for a common purpose, much can be accomplished.

I shall make no personal canvass, but will appreciate your support on Election day.
