Lauds Gov't Policies
 Justice Minister Stuart Garson said the Canadian government's financial policies mainly were responsible for maintaining the Canadian economy at a high level during 1949. "We almost completely avoided in Canada the 1949 recession which took place in the U.S.," said Mr. Garson in a speech prepared for delivery at the annual meeting of the Western Canada Petroleum Association in Calgary.

 CALVIN M. CHAPPELL
 After a long and trying illness, borne by Christian faith, the gentle spirit of Calvin M. Chappell passed on to be with his Saviour in that home of many mansions on the afternoon of Wednesday, Jan. 25 at his home in Kensington.
 Mr. Chappell had been in failing health since returning from overseas in World War One. In 1927 he suffered a serious illness which left him more or less unable to carry on an active life. Rail Shipments During January
 According to figures released over the week-end from the office of the provincial superintendent of the C. N. R. at Charlottetown, freight imports of canned goods show the greatest increase in either export or import shipments as compared with January 1949. Last year four carloads were brought in during the month of January, while this year this figure jumped to 21. In the export freight haul and straw show the greatest increase again this month having risen from 14 carloads in 1949 to 28 in 1950.
 Other rail exports which showed an increase were livestock, 33 as against 73, meats 21 against 11, potatoes 946 against 852, and vegetables 20 against nil last year. Turnips showed a decline this year, 139 against 164, as did eggs with only one carload exported against seven last year.
 In import traffic on the "Tormentine-Borden" ferry the three items which showed the largest increase were autos, 35 against 18 last year, coal 289 against 252, and railway coal 55 against 37. Imports of flour and feed dropped from 120 to 97 and gas and oils from 125 to 108.

Enjoyable Junior Piano Recital At Notre Dame
 "Hark! LONGING FOR NYLONS
PERSISTS IN BRITAIN
 Fashion question of the New Year for British women is: Will more nylons be available in 1950? The general answer seems to be: No. The director of one leading stocking firm said he could see "little chance of an increase in 1950. British women will still have to wait for their nylons." Another said though his firm would continue to press for a larger supply for the home market, nylons for export will still have priority. British nylon spinners who supply most of the yarn now are making 10 times as much as in 1948. By March they expect to be able to supply all the yarn nylon manufacturers can use without increasing plant machinery, which comes from the United States. Six of every 10 pairs of fully-fashioned British nylons go far export along with five of every 10 pairs of seamless. Britain exported 9,600,000 pairs worth \$1,975,548 (\$6,124,198) in 1949.
