### GERMANS TOOK TOWN'S MONEY

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 25.—The German military authorities at Lille, French Flanders, have again clashed with the populace, this time over the refusal of Lille factories to make sacks for use by the Germans as sand bags for their defence works. Unable to procure the sacks, the German authorities notified the Mayor that an amount equivalent to the output of the Lille factories would be manufactured in Germany and the cost of production assessed against the city. This was carried out, notwithstanding a vigorous protest.

The strong room of the town was forced and 375,000 francs, 375,000 francs was deducted from the civic funds.

In addition to this 31,000,000 francs of war taxes was demanded. Pending the payment of this sum the Germans placed seals on the banks, as well as on the strong rooms of individuals, as a guarantee that securities would not be removed.

The Lille authorities insisted that

this sum could not be met, whereupon the Germans suggested a compromise payment of 15,000,000 francs. A penalty of 100,000 francs a day was imposed pending payment.

### PREDICTS AERIAL SERVICE SOON.

LONDON, Sept. 27.—(Montreal Gazette Cable.)—An interview quoted Grahame White, the aviator, as saying: "I am quite certain that five years hence I will be running a daily line of aeroplanes, each carrying upwards of fifty passengers between London and the north of England. In ten years or less I shall be running a daily service of great passenger aeroplanes between London and New York. People will use their own aeroplanes, as they use their motors now, and it is but a small jump from private to public use. The aeroplaner will be as safe as a locomotive or a steamer, and possibly safer."

### THREE DISTINCT VICTORIES FOR RUSSIA

LONDON, Sept. 26.—The position of the Russians from Vilna to the Galician frontier, appears to have been improved greatly, three distinct victories having been recorded almost simultaneously, at widely scattered points on the eastern front.

This achievement has mitigated to some extent the uneasiness felt in England as to the attitude of Bulgaria.

East of Vilna, north of Pinsk, and in the vicinity of Lutsk, the Russians have scored heavily. The Germans characterize their reverses east of Vilna—that is at the Vileika railway junction—as of a temporary character notwithstanding their losses of guns and prisoners. Near Pinsk, Field Marshal Von Mackensen was thrown back in an engagement that has shaken his grip on the city.

Further south the Russians now holding Lutsk are pressing their advantage, and seem to be assuming the dominance on the southern end of the line in a manner recalling the fighting of last spring.
