The late Father John A. MacDonald, close friend and protector of Prince Edward Island's Indians for more than 40 years, was laid to rest at Grand River yesterday afternoon. The funeral service was celebrated in the little Catholic Church at Grand River by Bishop J. A. O'Sullivan, while a sorrowing congregation made up largely of Indians among whom the old priest had worked, kept in prayer.

In May we celebrated the 25th anniversary of the reign of King George V., and his voice as he spoke to his family on that day was heard in every part of his Empire, such are the wonders of wireless and radio.

### Travelling Expenses For Radio Com'ers

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Feb. 27.—Travelling expenses of members and officers of the Canadian Radio Commission form April 1933, to Feb. 21, 1934, amounted to slightly more than \$50,000, according to a return tabled in the House of Commons today in reply to a question by Harnas Deslauriers (Lib. St. Mary).

For the fiscal year 1933-34 the total was about \$17,000, for 1934-5 slightly over 24,000 and for the current fiscal year up to Feb. 21, \$13,700.

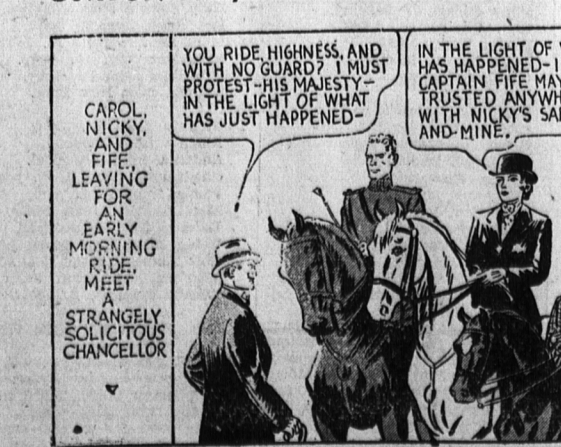
