BUCHAREST, Rumania, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Nazi in Rumania said tonight that Germany is initiating negotiations with Soviet Russia in the Balkans and in the Caucasus.

Hitler was reported to be using his veteran agent, Franz von Papen, to let his trip to Berlin and to report that his return from Ankara is in connection with the proposed negotiations.

Germany was represented as anxious to eliminate any possibility of conflict with Russia over both the Dardanelles, which Turkey guards, or over oil-rich Iran and other areas where the interests of the two powers may overlap if Hitler attempts a drive to the southeast in quest of oil.

The German is willing to make some concessions, it was reported, but it was considered problematical whether an agreement satisfactory to both parties could be reached.

possible axis sea landing operations in southern waters, either in the South Atlantic or the Caribbean approach to the Panama Canal.

A third possible reason given was that the naval vessels might be engaged in work connected with the establishment of bases on sites recently acquired from Great Britain. It was believed, however, that this would call for less secrecy than has been observed in connection with the present naval movements.

French assurances that the negotiations with the axis powers had not involved use of strategic bases of otherwise impaired France's sovereignty over its colonial empire appeared to have been received with some reserve here pending a more complete explanation of the Vichy government's collaboration with Germany and Italy.

Apart from the French possessions in the western hemisphere, officials were interested in Dakar, French West Africa, the nearest African port to South America. The sudden departure of the German freighter Helgoland from Barranquilla, Colombia, three days ago, which carried papers, also aroused interest among officials.
