The city market was fairly well attended yesterday and prices were fair. Butter dropped to eighteen and twenty cents a lb in both retail and dealers prices, lamb by the quarter also dropped going at ninety cents to a dollar and one half. The other prices remained unchanged.

The annual meeting of the P. E. Island Pharmaceutical Association will be held in the Board of Trade Rooms, Charlottetown, today at 2.30 p. m. It is expected that there will be a good representation of members from the different parts of the province.

The large and commodious store of F. D. Ling, North Wiltshire, was completely destroyed by fire on Friday night, 10th inst. His new dwelling house which is about completed, was saved, owing chiefly to the favorable condition of the wind. The barn at the rear of store was only saved by the untiring efforts of the neighbors, who formed themselves into bucket brigades and conveyed the water from the river. Mr. Ling's loss is a heavy one being only partly covered with insurance, but it is understood it has not prevented the continuance of the business.

The proposed organization of a branch of the Daughters and Maids of the Empire Society has been forwarded to this city. This society although separate from the Sons of England is along the same lines and the social part of the organization is a particular branch of the society from which the sisters of the order will be enabled to derive much personal pleasure aside from the financial benefits in which members may participate. The charter members will meet tonight in the S. O. E. Hall at eight o'clock sharp for initiation and the installation of officers, and all charter applicants are requested to be present.

MILLION AND A QUARTER OF TREES IN VAST ORCHARD.

Seventeen Thousand Acres Being Given up to Apples and Other Commercial Fruits.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 13.—The Arcadia Orchard Company, headed by E. N. Robinson of Spokane, is planting 17,000 acres of land to apples and other commercial fruits near Deer Park, Wash., twenty-two miles north of here. A thousand acres have been planted, 4,000 acres are clearing and ready for trees, and it is expected that the work on the rest of the land, now mostly standing timber will be completed within five years.

The tract will be irrigated by water from Loon and Deer lakes, the gravity system calling for eight and a half miles of low ditch and flume, eighteen miles of high ditch, a tunnel of 1,000 feet and a pipe line, forty-eight inches in diameter and two miles in length, from Loon lake to the land.

Three hundred thousand apple trees will be planted next fall, after the planting will be at the rate of 600,000 a year. One and a quarter million trees are required for the entire tract, which will be the largest orchard in the country, if present plans are carried out. It is proposed to colonize the land with city dwellers.

MAYOR GETS 50 CENTS A YEAR.

The people of Hopetown, Ill., have re-elected Mayor C. H. Finley. He has also received a cheque for his annual salary, 50 cents. The eight aldermen receive 25 cents a year salary.

"The city attorney and the city clerk are allowed to serve more than one two-year term," City Clerk Becker explained. The city treasurer is forbidden to serve more than one term, and as to the mayors—well, they won't, if they can help it. We've had mayors here in business who have given more time to the city's work than they've given to their own, and at 50 cents a year there is no money in it and certainly no graft."

The town has a population of 6000 and many industries. Prior to the panic of 1898 the Mayor received \$1 a year and aldermen 50 cents. Owing to hard times they agreed to cut their salaries in half and they have not been restored to the old figures.
