**Last Of Series  
Of Prayer Services  
Held At Citadel**

The last of a series of inspiring services of worship in connection with the week of prayer was held Saturday night in the Salvation Army Citadel, Major Green of St. John conducted the service assisted by the various City ministers. Miss Minnie Downe led the worship as she sang a solo, "Trust and Obey."

Rev. H. L. Dorr brought the message on the theme, "The Christian's Resources, Text Matt. 7:7. The Christian is on an island set in the sea of life. In and of himself he is limited. He is always concerned about resources.

What is the location of the Christian's resources? (1) Part of them are found within the person himself. He has power to think, certain qualities of heart and other possibilities planed within us. (2) The resources of God may become the resources of the Christian. Think of the power of God that can redeem the lowest sinner. The Christian's resources are great, brought by Jesus Christ. (3) The Christian has the blessing of Christian fellowship. He has resources in his fellow Christians. (4) God's word abounds with resources for the Christian—principles for living, promises, men's experiences of God. (5) Prayer is a great resource. (6) There is a great treasure being stored up for us in the beyond. These resources are actual and real. They are limitless.

Many Christians are weak and anaemic in their Christian life. They just touch the surface of our resources.

How shall the Christian tap his resources? (a) He must look for them. He must have faith, believe that God is and the reminder of them that diligently seek Him, that Christ is his Saviour and he may commune with Him.

When a man seeks God, he finds God looking for him.

The Christian, through faith, is availed of the resources of God. We must keep open the lines of communication between ourselves and God through service and sacrifice. We must communicate what we receive to others.

Eaton, supervisor of Island Illustration Stations, and W. R. Shaw, deputy minister of agriculture. The delegation suggested in order to produce grain could be accomplished by better cleaning of seed and the elimination of weeds.

**Second Alternative**

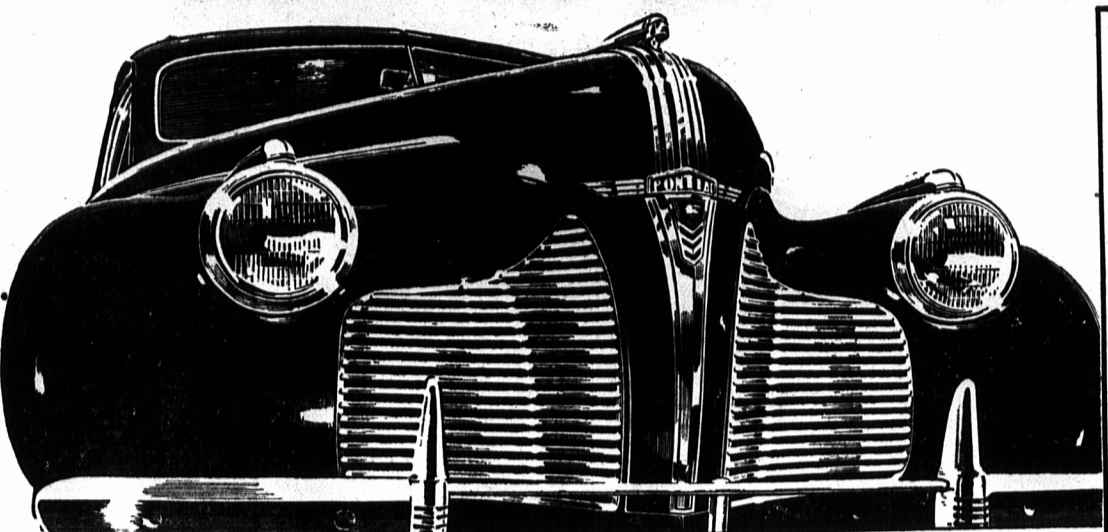
The second alternative was that Germany might be concentrating troops along the Netherlands and Belgian frontiers or spreading reports to that effect in order to give the lowland countries another dose of the war of nerves.

One of Germany's chief concerns is to keep the small neutral nations subservient to her and disposed to do what she wants. This might be accomplished, or at least attempted, by frightening them every few weeks, by bleeding them financially, and by forcing them to maintain big defence forces so that they may be more amenable to suggestions and proposals from Berlin.

Of these alternatives British official circles are inclined to accept the second as an explanation of the weekend events in the low countries. But they are watching the whole situation closely, because if the Germans invade either Holland or Belgium there is no doubt that the allied armies would step in. Belgium has been given guarantees by Britain and France—incidentally by Germany as well—but even apart from that one of Britain's cardinal military principles for generations has been never to permit the conquest of the low countries.

It was a misunderstanding of that principle that led the Kaiser in 1914 into believing that Britain would remain neutral.
