CRYSTAL CLUB ORGANIZED LAST EVENING

Ways And Means of Furthering Interests Of The New Club Discussed—Election of Officers.

SUMMERSIDE, March 4—A large and enthusiastic meeting was held in the Town Hall, Summerside, tonight to organize a Summerside Crystal Hockey Club of which all citizens of Summerside interested in hockey are cordially invited to become members. The membership fee was fixed at one dollar. Mr. H. M. Downing was appointed to act as chairman of the meeting and Mr. W. W. Muttiar, secretary.

Mr. Downing, in his opening remarks, explained that the object in forming the new club was that formerly the Crystal club executive consisted only of the players, and as their time was mostly taken up by the game itself, they were without a proper board of management to look after the other very necessary particulars, which are important to the successful carrying on of good hockey to the satisfaction of all. As there had been a good deal of interest manifested in hockey at the present time, Mr. Downing felt that this was an opportune time to get the new organization under way. A nominating committee was appointed to nominate the executives of the different committees of the new club. After the committee had brought in their list it was put to the vote of the meeting. Ramblers Trim The Papermakers In Amherst 3-1

AMHERST, N. S., March 4—The Amherst Ramblers upset all hockey dope here tonight when they showed a clean pair of heels to the Bathurst Papermakers and defeated them 3 to 1. A tough break for MacDonald gave Dud James, Bathurst centre, the single score for the visiting team. It was a snap shot from the wing that caught the goalie under the arm and glanced into the twine.

The Ramblers in gaining this victory over the Former Maritime Champions sprung a complete surprise upon the "Northerners" and the Maritime Provinces as well, although the local players were quite confident before the game that they were going to take the invaders into camp.

The Bathurst players after the game praised the ability of the Ramblers, but stated that a different showing would be made up on the larger sheet of ice in the northern rink. The Ramblers in their game tonight not only had an advantage in territory, but out shot the Papermakers 40-33.

The Bathurst players were badly puzzled by the Amherst method of play, and their fast breaking forward line was stopped by the pokechecking tactics of the locals. Play after play was halted in a stride and frequently the Amherst forwards left the Bathurst team down the ice. Only Taylor and Dud James had an edge in speed upon the Amherst team and they were hard pressed upon occasions.

The hard work and general effectiveness of the Amherst lineup was the outstanding feature of play tonight. One fistic combat marked the game. Blair Carroll and Arthur Dalton clashed in the first period and drew down major penalties. Dalton subsequently engaged in a brief battle in the penalty box, but the principals were soon separated. Following this fracas the other penalties were few and far between. Victor Fraser opened the scoring for Amherst in the first period, when he caught Doccite White's rebound and scored. It was the only goal of the first period. In the second frame Dud James, with a long wing rush, broke around Paddy Cormier and went to shoot on MacDonald, the rising puck caught under MacDonald's arm and glanced into the twine. After this incident Victor Fraser broke through the Bathurst defence on two occasions and with open nets in front of him shot wild into the corner. In the third period Paddy Cormier, in the brilliant rush of the game when he came down the ice and circled the Bathurst nets, he passed over to D. S. White with a backward sweep and rubber into the twine. Victor Fraser scored the third decisive goal of the match when he stucked in and around the Bathurst defence. He was chased toward the corner, but snapping a shot at Bond that caught the Bathurst goalie napping. The red light flashed.

Amherst tonight has engaged in a genuine old time hockey celebration and several score fans will accompany the Amherst team to Bathurst on Friday. It is felt that the lead in the north the Ramblers will prove a serious threat to the honors in the Maritimes.
