THE CITY COUNCIL PASS ESTIMATES

After Quelling A "Storm in a Tin-Cup", They Were Passed Without Debate—By-Laws to Specify Rate of Assessment Etc.

A special meeting of the City Council was held last night for the purpose of passing the estimates for the year. His Worship Mayor Prowse presided, and all the Councilors were present.

The draft estimates were then read by Coun. Rogers, Chairman of the Finance Committee. Councilor Hedden wanted to know who had prepared these estimates.

It developed that the Chairman of the Finance Committee had prepared the draft. It had been submitted to Councilor Johnson, but Councilor Riley stated that he had not been made aware of the estimates as submitted.

Coun. Stewart—Not so. Coun. Rogers—I asked you to come up. Coun. Riley—At half-past seven?

Coun. Rogers—Yes, that was time enough. You would not come up. Coun. Hedden said that neither Coun. Campbell, Riley nor himself had been consulted since February regarding any expenditure by the Finance Committee.

His Worship—His duty is to prepare a draft of the estimates and he is supposed to be assisted by the chairmen of committees, who should

consult with him as regards new lights that would have to come before the Council. After some further discussion of the point the debate cooled and the estimates were submitted as follows and passed:—

D. McKenzie will also resign to contest the same riding as Murray's successor to the Premiership of Nova Scotia.
