Mr. Blackwood was the grandson of William Blackwood, the founder of the publishing house of William Blackwood and Sons, Edinburgh and London.

JOHNSON THE LEADING PITCHER OF SEASON

CHICAGO, Nov. 12.—Although Joe Wood, the hero of the world series, tops the list of pitchers in the 1912 American league, averages issued today, Walter Johnson of the Washington Club, probably is the leading pitcher of the season. In games won and lost, Wood excels Johnson, but the Washington pitcher worked in seven more games than did Wood. Johnson struck out 203 men in 358 innings, the season's record, and held 1,321 opposing batsmen to eighty-nine runs. Wood pitched 344 innings in 43 games, during which 104 runs were scored off him. He struck out 258 batters. The Boston pitcher won 34 out of 39 games, while Johnson won 32 out of 44 besides playing the season. Edward Walsh of the Chicago team, was the "Work Horse" of the season. He pitched 62 games, twelve more than any pitcher in the league.

PROFESSIONAL HOCKEY TEAM FOR SYDNEY

SYDNEY, Nov. 12.—The indications are that Sydney will have a professional hockey team this season. Great interest is being taken in the sport this year by prominent business men, and the fact that a large new rink is being erected lends additional interest to the matter. It is expected that Sydney will be represented at the Nova Scotia Hockey meeting by Toby McDonald, a former Crescent player, on behalf of Sydney.

CONCRETE RADIATORS.

Germany has found concrete to be an excellent material for the construction of radiators for steam and hot-water heat, and at recent hygienic exhibitions such radiators were shown in all possible forms and colours. The most important features of these radiators has to do very intimately with hygiene. Being porous, they furnish moisture as well as heat to the air in a room which is most desirable. It is also stated that they heat more quickly and cool off more slowly than an iron radiator, and that they cost much less than the latter.

SURPRISES IN STRIKE LEADER'S TRIAL

SALEM, Mass., Nov. 12.—Two surprises, one for the defence and one for the Commonwealth, came in the trial of Giovanni Caruso murder trial yesterday, when Thomas Harold Kanada, a former employe of the Lawrence Textile Mills, brought from Cleveland, Ohio by the prosecution, testified that he saw the defendant, Caruso, stab Policeman Oscar Benoit, in the back, during the riot in which Anna Lopizzo was killed, and also that he saw Policeman Marshall, of Lawrence, at that time with a revolver in his hands. The surprise occasioned by Kanada's identification of Caruso was no greater than that which followed when in response to a question from the District attorney he declared he had seen Officer Marshall immediately after the stabbing and shooting, with a revolver in his hands. The police, who were at the scene of the riot, have declared that they did not draw their revolvers.

GRIP OF STEEL TRUST IN AUSTRALIA.

LONDON, Nov. 12.—In the struggle with the international trust which controls the world's output of steel rails in connection with the £1,000,000 contract for rails for the Trans-

continental line, the Federal Government has been worsted, says the Melbourne correspondent of the Daily Chronicle. The struggle began three months back after the indignation rejection by the Labor Ministry of the trust firm's tender, on account of the extortionate prices quoted, and ended a few weeks ago when the Government capitulated and gave two American and English firms orders for 18,000 tons each at trust prices and an Australian works at Liffgow an order for 10,000 tons at a special price, leaving the provision of the remainder for the rails until next year. Sensational stories are current here concerning the tactics of the trust. When the Government endeavored to obtain supplies after the rejection of the tenders submitted in May, the French, English, Scottish, Austrian, Belgian, American and Russian rail-makers refused to quote at all in competition with the other members of the trust. At one stage when the Ministry decided to bar German rails pressure from an unknown quarter was exerted which forced the British firms to withdraw their quotations and this compelled the Government's agents to reopen the negotiations. The scheme to obtain rails via Japan also failed. These disclosures are to form the subject of an important statement in Parliament next week and are bound to strengthen the demand for the nationalization of the iron industry.

We regret to have to record the death of Mrs. H. Fairclough, the beloved wife of Henry Fairclough, which sad event occurred on Sunday morning at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. W. R. Nelson. Mr. Fairclough resided here about two years ago, since then he has been farming at Birch Creek, Sask. About four weeks ago he took his wife to Winnipeg to consult a specialist, who reported cancer of the throat and held out no hope of recovery. They came to Dubuc to relatives, and the deceased lady had been suffering ever since. A very pathetic circumstance was the fact that deceased had been unable to eat or drink anything for some time, the ultimate cause of death being practically starvation. The deceased, however, bore her sufferings with commendable fortitude, but when the end came it must have been a great relief. Two sons, Howard and Percy, drove about 150 miles to be present at the last sad rites.

G. W. Abernethy, assisted by the choir, conducted the funeral service in the Presbyterian Church on Tuesday, afternoon, where the mourners and sympathetic friends had gathered. The choir sang appropriate hymns, among which was one of deceased favorites, "God be with you till we meet again." The interment took place at the local cemetery.
