VOTE TAKEN
FAVORS STRIKE

C. P. R. Employees Re-
ject Company's Of-
fer of Wage Increase.

(Special to the Guardian)
 MONTREAL, May 27.—The
 strike vote taken by the C. P. R.
 freight handlers, clerks, ware-
 housemen, etc., has been completed
 and the count is said to be 95 per
 cent in favor of the strike.
 This means that the men have
 refused the company's offer made
 after a majority report of the con-
 ciliation board had recommended a
 larger increase in wages. The men
 asked for 10 cents an hour in-
 crease. The company majority re-
 port favored four cents; the minority
 report no increase.
 Hon. Peter Heenan, Minister of
 Labor, got the company and the
 men together and finally the com-
 pany offered three cents for check-
 ers and two cents for truckers.
 The men receded from their four
 cents demand and suggested three
 cents all round as a compromise.
 The result, it is believed, will
 have an unfavorable effect on pre-
 sent negotiations between the
 Canadian National and its freight
 handlers, who are also negotiating
 following a board of conciliation
 award of four cents. The Cana-
 dian National has intimated its
 willingness to accede to the minority
 report which only recommended
 two cents. The men refused
 the company to meet again and
 discuss the question.

Canadian Office
Ordered Closed

(Canadian Press)
 MONTREAL, Que., May 27.—
 Loncin F. Guerin, head of the So-
 viet trade commission to Canada,
 today received the following cable
 from M. Litvinoff, Commissioner for
 Foreign Affairs, at Moscow—"If
 the Canadian Government does not
 want to maintain the treaty made
 by the Soviet and the British Gov-
 ernment in 1921, and applied to
 Canada, close your office, take all
 your staff and go home."
 Mr. Guerin said the above cable
 referred to the diplomatic offices of
 the Soviet in Montreal. He was
 waiting, he said, for advices from
 the commissar for foreign trade as
 to what he was to do with the
 trade commission office here. The
 Soviet government has maintained
 at two sets of offices here, one for
 its diplomatic staff and another for
 its trade commission.

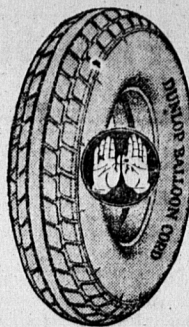
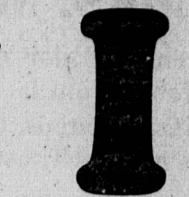
