THE MARKETS
OTTAWA, Ont., 28. (Eggs)—No changes are reported from Canadian egg markets today. The Chicago spot market remains steady at yesterday's quotations. TORONTO—There is a wide spread variation in paying prices today with dealers quoting for ungraded eggs, delivered extras 42-50, firsts 37-45, seconds 30-42, prices to retailers are unchanged at extras 45-50, firsts 35-55, seconds 40-42.
MONTREAL—There is an unsettled tendency on this market. United States storage are jobbing here at 42 and fresh at 45-49. Quotations to country shippers are unchanged from earlier in the week at extras 50-53, firsts 45-49, seconds 38-40, but these prices are not strong and a decline is possible.
EDMONTON—Receipts are increasing and this market is weaker. Fresh selling to retailers at extras 50, firsts 48, seconds 45.
VANCOUVER—Quotations to producers are extras 35, firsts 33, seconds 31, delivered but the market is weak and unsettled at these prices. A car left for the east yesterday costing extras 39, firsts 37 here. Prices to retailers are extras 40, firsts 38, seconds 36, with some dealers cutting prices.
ST. JOHN—The market is steady with good demand. Country dealers are paying extras 47, firsts 44, seconds 37.
HALIFAX—Prices to country shippers have advanced 3 cents making present paying prices 45, extras 51, firsts 40, seconds 33. Other prices are unchanged.
MONTREAL—The export and domestic trade in grain on the Montreal market today was quiet owing to the fact that foreign buyers failed to respond to the prices asked by local exporters on spot. The feeling was firm and prices were unchanged. There was a moderate demand from local buyers for spring wheat flour but the tone of the market was steady. Foreign trade was small. The flour market for winter wheat flour was also inactive but values were firm owing to the continued good demand for all lines of millfeed and the smaller supplies available. The undertone to the market is strong and indications are that prices will go higher in the near future. The trade in standard grades of rolled oats continued dull but prices ruled steady. The undertone to the market for all grades of eggs continued easy on account of the more liberal offerings available and especially so of fresh extras for which prices were cut another one cent per dozen. Other grades were unchanged. The receipts were 359 cases. The demand for potatoes showed a slight improvement and the feeling was steady. Car lots of Prince Edward Island Green Mountains were quoted \$1.80 per bag of ninety lbs and Quebec white stock at \$1.40 per bag of ninety lbs. Bulk at track. The butter market continued quiet but firm. No. 1 pasteurized was quoted at 41 cents to 41.2 cents per pound. The receipts were 35 packages. The cheese market was without any new features to note. Business in all directions being quiet with the undertone inclined to be easier. Western grades were quoted at 19 cents to 19.2 cents per pound. The receipts were 76 boxes.

Supreme Court
At the Supreme Court Thursday the case of Taylor vs. Pond and Bagnall an action on a promissory note was concluded before Justice Arsenault and a jury. The Judge gave judgment for non-suit against the plaintiff, Donald MacKinnon, K. C., and K. J. Martin, K. C., for plaintiff, and W. E. Bentley, K. C., for defendant.
Yesterday the case of Kathleen S. H. Wells of Montreal, vs. Kier Campbell of Alberton, came up before Justice Hazard and a jury for trial. The case is an action brought on a contract made between the plaintiff and defendant, whereby the defendant agreed to pay the plaintiff \$2000 should his brother, the late Donald Campbell, at the time of his death be insured for an amount greater than \$2000. The defendant pleaded among other things (1) that the alleged deed was not his deed; (2) that he was induced to execute the deed by fraud.
After several witnesses had been heard and the jury addressed by J. Martin, C. J., in behalf of the plaintiff and G. Gaudet, K. C., in behalf of the defendant, the jury was charged by Justice Hazard. Having deliberated for about an hour they returned with a verdict for the plaintiff.

and Mr. Sinclair will receive the additional amount granted leaders of parliamentary groups.
The four Independent-Liberals, Messrs. Pinard (Ottawa East), Proulx (Prescott), Belanger (Russell), and Lekaunt (Sturgeon Falls) will sit with the Liberals but will vote with the Conservatives on the Government Control bill. The sole Labor representative, Karl K. Homuth (Waterloo South), will also vote with the Conservatives on this question.

Government Control Plan
Premier Ferguson's plan of liquor sale by government control has been widely discussed since the election campaign of last November. Briefly, it is proposed to amend the Ontario Temperance Act to provide for establishment of a commission who will have the authority to issue licenses to persons over 21 years of age, who desire to purchase spirituous or mallicuous for their own use, and an annual permit upon which shall be entered each purchase and which may be suspended or cancelled at any time for abuse or misconduct.
A large portion of the province at the time of the institution of the Ontario Temperance Act in 1916, had already banished the sale of liquor under local option. It has been stressed that these "dry" areas will be respected and no sale of spirituous and mallicuous liquor will be allowed in these areas until the people of these municipalities indicate by vote their desire for a change. The commission, however, may establish at such places as it may select in other portions of the province, dispensaries for the sale of spirituous and mallicuous liquor in packaged packages to persons holding official permits. To the commission, whose personal has yet to be announced, will likely be entrusted all details of administration of the new system. Expectations are that the system will be in operation by May.
There will be added another chapter to the chequered history of the Ontario Temperance Act. Plebiscites in 1919 and 1924 failed to overturn it, although each time the majority in its favor was decreased. In 1925 another amendment allowed sale of the now famous 4.4 per cent beer, which however, failed to meet the demands of the "wet" factions while it was opposed by the "dry" sale. The popular majority for government control at the last general elections was 241,632 in a total vote of 1,137,878.

Other New Legislation
The amendment to the O. T. A. while dominant, is not by any means the only piece of legislation to come before the assembly. Upward revisions in the speed limit, probably to 35 miles an hour; an iteration in the marriage law, and a requirement on the part of all vehicles to carry lights at night, constitute diverse but interesting features of the legislative programme. The speed limit will be 10 miles an hour faster than the present 25. The measure to have all vehicles carry lights after dark has been up for discussion a long time, and it is believed the public is now ready to support the regulation, opposition formerly having come from farmers who disliked being forced to carry lights on their horse-drawn wagons. The changes contemplated in the marriage law are a result of the strange situation which arose in Toronto last year, when Rev. A. F. Winnipeg-Lagran, Bishop of London, found himself prevented from performing the marriage ceremony for his niece, the law requiring that officiating clergymen be residents of the province.

"Musical" Operation
Successful in New York Hospital
Ethelless Operations Performed To Music To Lessen Mind Shock

NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—Music has been successfully employed at St. Mark's Hospital, Eleventh Street and Second Avenue, in the last month to minimize the "physic shock" experienced by adults while undergoing operations performed under spinal anaesthesia. It was announced yesterday by Henry E. Meeker, president.
The value of the "musical operation" was the first proved in distracting the attention of children having their tonsils and adenoids removed. Mr. Meeker said. It was then tried out on adults, who were forced to undergo operations without the aid of ether because of a weak heart or lungs. Cocaine was injected into the spine of such patients to deaden the nerves and render the operation painless, but they remained conscious. Music was found "extremely effective" in diverting their thoughts from the operation.
The "musical operation" was made possible through an earphone device which Dr. J. S. Bresnahan and an assistant arranged so phonograph music could be transmitted to the patient from a room 100 feet distant without being audible to the operating surgeon, according to Mr. Meeker. The device, consisting of a headpiece, in which a system of electro-magnets is arranged similar to a radio receiving set, a transmitting wire and a tone arm, also eliminates the danger of dust being stirred up in the operating room by the revolving record of the phonograph.
The idea proved particularly successful during an operation upon a Polish woman who had been in great mental stress because of her inability to understand English, hospital attendants said. Her nervousness immediately subsided when the earphones were attached and Paderewski's "Minute" was played on the phonograph.
"Music has long been known to have curative value," Mr. Meeker pointed out. "The National Association for Music in Hospitals gave 10,000 musical programs in hospitals during the last year."

TORONTO, Jan. 28.—"At the request of Hon. R. B. Bennett we have investigated the report carried by the Canadian Press of his speech in Mr. Meighen's constituency during the last Dominion election campaign," said J. F. B. Livesay its general manager who has returned from a trip to the coast. This speech was made on September 9th and on the following day Mr. Bennett wired from Maple Creek that what he had said about the Hudson Bay railway had been misquoted, adding that he had read at the meeting Mr. Meighen's reply to the On-To-The-Bay Association, stating that such was the policy of the government and by that he stood.
The Canadian Press promptly carried this statement over its news wires that Friday night and next day carried a full statement to the same effect given to Calgary.

This was one of the discoveries of a party of Montrealeurs who have just returned from inaugurating the "Blanc Bec Trail" Tourist snowshoes journeys over trap lines in the northern forests which have been organized under the auspices of the Canadian National Railways to provide a new attraction for winter visitors to Canada. Only two men, the chief trainer and his son, are allowed to approach the stables where these animals are kept and they have been handling the wolves ever since their capture as cubs. In the Price Brothers teams as in other Quebec entries other innovations besides breeding have been made. When Emile St. Godard, Earl Brydges, Shorty Russick and other noted mushers from the Pas, Manitoba, came to Quebec in recent years to contest for honors here they were able to walk away from the Quebec entries for various reasons.

Employees Have Narrow Escape
HULL, Que., Jan. 28.—Six employees of the E. B. Eddy Company sulphite plant here narrowly escaped death by suffocation last night while engaged in fighting a fire which broke out in the "chip boxes" of the plant.
Two of the men are in hospital here in a more or less serious condition, suffering from inhaling smoke.
The fire was extinguished shortly after midnight. The damage is reported to be slight.
