CHEESE BOARD.—The cheese board met in the city Friday with a full attendance. President Walter Simpson in the chair. The buyers present were Messrs. Spillet-Biffin and Mowbray. The cable message from Brockville read: Three thousand cases offered; 1450 sold at 16 1/2. Current price lower. Mr. Biffin offered 14% for selections of the board, salesman refused to sell at this figure. The following factories boarded cheese: Stanley Bridge, 180; New Glasgow 300; Cornwall 400; East River, 90 flats; Hazelbrook, 200 flats; Orwell, 200; Union, 200 flats. UNDERDRAINAGE EXPERIMENT.—Professor W. R. Reek returned Friday night from Wellington, where he had spent the week superintending the installation of the demonstration field in underdrainage. A field of four acres was surveyed and six drains, each 500 feet in length, emptying into an open ditch on the road, were laid down. On Monday afternoon the field was surveyed and the trenches opened with the plough. On Tuesday morning two men were employed to dig the trenches and on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday forenoon six men were employed. The trenches were laid and the trenches filled with a team and plough, the work being completed at noon Friday. In addition to putting in 3,000 feet of tile an open ditch 40 rods long and sufficiently deep to carry the water from the underdrains was made. The dirt taken out of the ditch was placed on the road and without doubt will be a great benefit to it as it makes a better crown and will always have excellent surface drainage. Professor W. J. Reid was associated with Professor Reek while the work was in progress. The experiment in this field will be watched with a great deal of interest, and the Guardian will report regularly when observations are taken.

Somewhere in Europe, Sept. 29, 1915. Mr. C. McArthur of Brace McKay & Co., Summerside, has received an interesting souvenir from the front being the nose of a large German shell, sent to him by an Island boy accompanied by the following letter.

Mr. C. McArthur, Pres. Brace McKay & Co., Summerside, P. E. Island. Dear Sir:

I have just received the tobacco you sent to my brother for me and on behalf of my comrades and myself.

I cannot thank you enough and should I be lucky enough to return home again I will call and thank you in person, while we are happy in fighting for a just cause it makes our task lighter to know that our folks and countrymen at home have not forgotten us. There is quite a lot of Island boys in our Brigade but only one Island boy besides myself is in our company. I cannot tell you where we are for that is not allowed however we are in the fight and confident of winning. It is raising quite a lot and there is plenty of mud in the trenches but this is war and we must make the best of it. The funny part of it here is the funny way the boys laugh and joke right under the very fire of the enemy. They have been shelling us quite a lot lately but the only extent of their damage for the last two days has been to knock some mud off our hut and the top of a church spire. I am sending you the point of a German shell which fell quite close to us. It is of a large variety likely a ten inch one you can make it into a paper weight for your desk and I hope you receive it in good time. There is quite an artillery duel

on now with our boys doing the big end of it. That is a common occurrence here, and we are used to their shells now. We are fairly well supplied with food but luxuries are at a premium.
