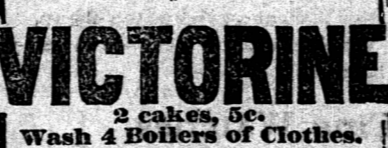

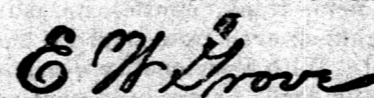

On Thursday, May 30th, a meeting of the Directors of the Comstock Gold Mining Co., was held and the Manager authorized to go ahead with work just as vigorously as possible. A Contract to drive a development tunnel has been let and no delays will be made in prosecuting the work.

The Dominion Govt. has granted the Canadian Pacific Railway \$96,000 for the Lardau Branch Line and the Lardau newspapers just to hand say it is likely trains will be running to Trout Lake (our shipping point) by November.
