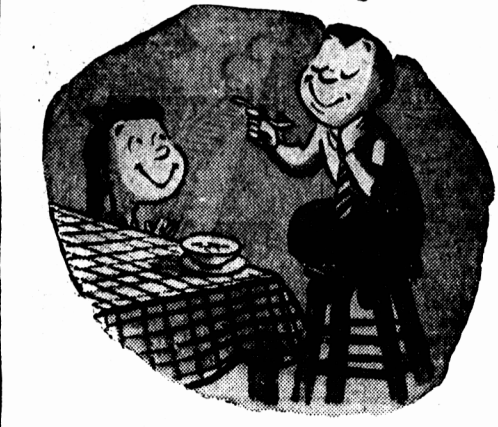

MR. LEWIS H. HOWATT

There passed peacefully away at his home, Victoria, B. C., on June 3rd, last, after a lingering illness patiently borne under submission to the Divine Will Mr. Lewis H. Howatt in his 78th year.

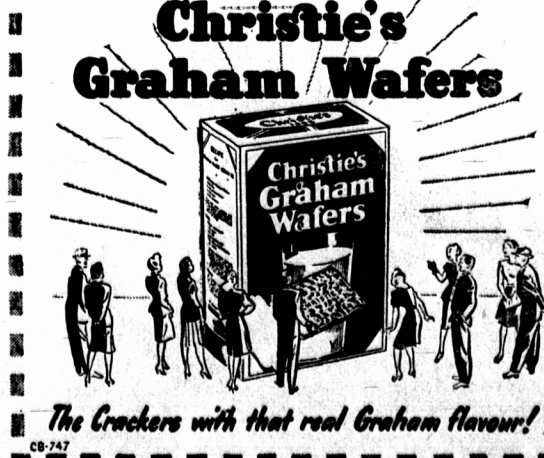
My advice to you is to, at least, carry on your amours outside of the family circle.
