3-Act Comedy At S'Side High School

The Saint Paul's Dramatic Players presented their three-act comedy, "Here Comes Charlie," on Monday evening in the Summerside High School Auditorium to a large and highly appreciative audience.

Directed by J. Arthur Clow, the cast this year was made up of many of the old favorites of yesteryear who have made the name of St. Paul's Dramatic Players synonymous with good clean entertainment.

Built for laughing purposes, the play was deftly handled to the complete satisfaction of the audience who were generous in their applause both for the players and the specialties between the acts.

Master Douglas Pineau, youthful piano accordion artist, was a decided hit and was encored repeatedly. Between acts two and three a trio composed of Miss Eleanor Peters, Miss Mary Huestis and Miss Mary Gillis was outstanding in their comedy number.

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Two S'side Aircraft Complete Polar Flight

Appearing out of a very low overcast, the Summerside-based Lancaster aircraft, Polaris, circled the airfield and then touched down for a landing at her home port at 8:35. Atlantic Standard Time Saturday, concluding a non-stop flight of approximately 3,000 miles from Whitehorse, Y. T.

The flight brought back the nine members of the first R. C. A. F. specialist navigation course who had been based at Whitehorse for the past two weeks carrying out training flights in the Arctic.

During this time the Zenith carried out a flight to the geographic North Pole, thereby being the first R. C. A. F. aircraft to fly over the top of the earth.

Squadron Leader W. L. Gillespie of Summerside and Toronto, who is in charge of the course and planned the Pole flight, talked about it on his arrival in Summerside Saturday morning.

On Sunday, April 30, the Zenith flew from Whitehorse to Kittiquaid, an advanced base of the R. C. A. F. on May 2 the aircraft became airborne for the historic trip and at 9:45 the Zenith became the first R. C. A. F. aircraft to fly over the north geographic pole.

The flight to and from the Pole was uneventful, S/L Gillespie said, and took about 14 hours.

Aboard the Zenith for this flight were the following: officer commanding, S/L W. L. Gillespie, Toronto; captain - F/L J. A. Moss, Northwood, London, England; co-pilot - F/O J. W. Lowe, Kapuskasing, Ont.; navigators - F/L E. J. Haugen, Pelly, Sask., F/L L. M. MacLean, Calgary, Alta., Capt. W. R. Haughey, (USAF), Los Angeles, California, F/O H. A. Smith, Toronto, Ont.; radio officer - F/O K. P. Larush, Toronto, Ont.; meteorologist - Mr. C. G. Goodbrand, Dept. of Transport, Hamilton, Ont.

Zenith and her sister aircraft, Polaris, also flew to the north magnetic pole, S-L Gillespie explained, to the calculations made from the most recent information, on Prince of Wales Island in the Canadian Arctic.

One of the main problems of flying in the Canadian Arctic is that, in the vicinity of the magnetic pole, the ordinary magnetic compass becomes useless as a direction indicator, and recourse has to be made to other means of determining direction.

On approach to the pole the needles of the magnetic compasses carried in the aircraft swung aimlessly around, and remained useless until the aircraft were well on their way back to Whitehorse.

The flights gave the students navigation experience in that perhaps the most difficult area of the Arctic for the aviator.

S-L Gillespie briefly summed up the purpose of the flights as, "to acquaint the students of the first R. C. A. F. specialist navigation course with the problems peculiar to polar flying and to give them practice in the technique required."

Six training flights were flown from Whitehorse during the two-week period, making a total of 27,000 miles. S-L Gillespie said that many photographs were taken of the Arctic terrain which should be of considerable assistance to the Air Force as they will show the movements of ice fields.

Instructors and crew after the flight were W-C G.R.F. Gross, C.O. of the station and W-C D.A. Willis, D.F.C., O.C. of the Air Navigation School.

Power Shovel Operator Has Close Call - A power shovel, complete with boom and clam-shell, operating on Bentinck Cove wharf, on the north side about three miles from Miscouche, suddenly tumbled over the side into the water about 11:30 Saturday morning.

The operator of the shovel, Mr. Merrill Wallace of Elmsdale, although caught by surprise, managed to jump out onto the wharf just as the machine went over.

Morrison and MacRae, Ltd. of Summerside have a Dominion government contract to dredge around the wharf for the benefit of the oyster fishermen who operate in considerable numbers from this cove in Malpeque Bay.

The work was being done with this machine from the wharf, scooping up the mud and depositing it in trucks, which carried it up on the shore. Apparently the weight of the mud in the shovel and the fact that the boom was turning caused a shifting of the center of balance and almost without any warning the whole apparatus valued at \$12,000.00 went overboard.

Immediately salvage operations were commenced and with the aid of a bulldozer the bucket was shortly pulled ashore. Working from a boat at low tide the body of the machine was later made fast and dragged up on land.

Officials of the company yesterday estimated damage to the machine as about four or five thousand dollars. They plan to move a heavier machine to the location and complete the job.
