OPEN DOORS.

Some of us are always on the lookout for the chance of doing some really splendid thing. Plenty of small opportunities come across our paths, but we will have none of them; they are not good enough. This is a pity, because God opens many and various doors of usefulness for us, and to pass them by because we do not fancy the look of what lies behind and to continue searching for something better, is foolish in the extreme. It is to the one who works steadily up the ladder of life that the golden chances come, not to him who thinks tricks are beneath his notice and unworthy of his toil. How apt we are, in thinking of our daily lives, to look at the happenings in them from our own point of view, and to leave alone all thoughts of others! Ought we not to

remember that it is an ill wind that blows nobody good, and that perchance the occurrence that seems to us such a tiresome one may be a great blessing to others? If we had things just as we should like them, I am afraid that our neighbors would begin to complain, and that not without cause. THE ROSENTHAL CASE.

(Canadian Press.) NEW YORK, July 30—A sensational development in the Rosenthal case came up tonight with the arrest of Police Lieutenant Becker, charged with complicity in the murder of the gambler. He was arraigned before the magistrate and pleaded not guilty and was remanded to the Tombs. The arrest of Tecker came as the sequel to the summoning together of the Grand Jury late today, after a conference between District Attorney Whitman and Harry Vallon (Herman Valensky), "Bridgie" Webber and Jack Rose (Jacob Rosenzweig), three of the men under arrest in connection with the case, and the attorneys and the appearance of several other witnesses before the Grand Jury. Becker was arrested at Bath Gate Avenue Police Station in the Bronx where he has been on duty, on the charge of extortion. At the time not a mere inkling of the more serious charge to be placed against him was given. Meanwhile the Grand Jury, which was then in session, had voted the murder indictment. The police lieutenant, who had been suspended

by Commissioner Waldo after arrest, was hurried before Judge Mulqueen and through his attorney entered a plea of "Not Guilty." (Canadian Press.) NEW YORK, July 30—The arrest of Lieut. Becker charged with the Rosenthal murder lays bare a scandal that threatens to stab the police department to its very foundations. Bold Jack Rose has revealed the entire plot including the instructions for Becker for the death of the gambler and the names of those who did the killing.

SMALLPOX IN QUEBEC.

(Canadian Press.) QUEBEC, July 20—Smallpox is declared to be rife in both Ancienne and Jeanne Lorette. The outbreak of disease is said to be a mild one. The Health Dept. of the Province has been notified and active steps will be taken at once to combat the disease.

TWO MEN INJURED.

(Canadian Press.) NEW YORK, July 30—Jas. Varall, manager of a saloon near Broadway Sak, and his bartender were wounded early this morning by gangsters who objected to their efforts to quiet them.

THE TITANIC DISASTER.

(Canadian Press.) LONDON, July 30—The judgment of the British Board of Trade Court of inquiry into the Titanic disaster was delivered today. The Court finds the collision was due to excessive speed, that proper watch was not kept and that the Californian might have reached the sinking vessel. It also finds the arrangements for manning boats insufficient but no discrimination against the third-class passengers. It exonerates J. Bruce Ismay and Sir Cosmo, Duff-Gordon from the charges of improper conduct. The court recommends more water tight compartments, provision of life boats, for all on board, efficient drill for crew and better lookouts.

JACK JOHNSON LEAVES RING.

(Canadian Press.) CHICAGO, July 30—Jack Johnson, champion heavy weight pugilist of the world, announces that he has fought his last fight. "Promoters won't give me my price for fighting now, and if I wait a year I'll not be in the condition to put up a fight worthy of a champion, he says."

MISER STARVES.

(Canadian Press.) NEW YORK, July 30—Rosa Connolly, aged 74, died of starvation on the street at day break. \$2,000 in yellow bags were found in her stockings.

THE DARROW TRIAL.

(Canadian Press.) LOS ANGELES, July 30—Clarence S. Darrow, who is on trial for alleged jury bribery took the witness stand in his own behalf yesterday. Darrow contradicted the testimony given by George Behm and Bert Franklin which had been considered damaging to his case.

(Canadian Press.) BOSTON, July 30—The strike of conductors and motormen of the Boston Elevated Railway Co., which has lasted 3 days and is estimated to have cost \$1,028,000 ended tonight by the agreement of the Company officers to the terms of settlement, the strikers winning every point sought. The strikers will begin to go back to work tomorrow.

TO STRENGTHEN BONDS OF WESTERN HEMISPHERE.

WASHINGTON, July 27—A quiet movement begun some time ago, looking to a tightening of the bonds of sympathy and interest between the States of the Western Hemisphere is beginning to take tangible form and in the near future it is expected a great pan-American conference will be held, perhaps in Washington, although some other American capital may be selected as the meeting place. Recognizing the existence of suspicion and distrust on the part of the smaller States of Latin-America tow-

and their more powerful neighbor an effort is to be made to link together men of high intelligence and movers in great public affairs in the various countries, for the common purpose of diminishing international friction and the risks of war by the creation of a Pan-American international law conference. The plan contemplates the creation of a pan-American conference on the basis of a membership of five international lawyers in each of the republics. To further the plan a special edition in Spanish magazine of the Carnegie Endowment is being sent to all American Governments.

LOST LIFE IN VAIN EFFORT TO SAVE BOY.

TORONTO, July 28—Captain Frank Beaumont, of the steamer Alport, and his little nephew, Jack, aged ten years, eldest son of George Beaumont, of this city, were drowned near Beaumaris on Saturday afternoon. The little fellow fell overboard, and the captain jumped after him, and caught him, just as he was going down for the third time, and started back towards his boat, when he was seen to sink, leaving the boy struggling on the surface for a few seconds, when he sank before assistance could reach him. Captain Beaumont was the fourth son of J. J. Beaumont, of Alport farm, Muskoka River. A search party recovered both parties in twenty-five feet of water this morning.


