**Presbytery Meeting**

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in special session at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, September 2nd in the Murray Harbor North Presbyterian Church and was opened in due form. In the absence of the Moderator, Rev. Charles J. St. Clair Jeans, Rev. Thos. A. Rodger was appointed Moderator pro tem.

Those present were Rev. Thos. A. Rodger, Moderator, pro tem; Rev. R. Hensley Stavert, Clerk; Rev. W. E. Davies, Rev. Allister Murray, Rev. R. Moorehead Legate and Messrs. David Sencebaugh, Thos. W. Morrison, John Cameron, Russell G. McLaren and Robert Docherty, representative elders.

Others present, not members of the court were, Rev. P. Watson Currie and Messrs. Thos. Miller, Wm Kennedy, Oswald Graham, Chas. K. Martin, Jas. Currie and Neil McSwain, elders.

The principal item of business before the court was the induction of Rev. P. Watson Currie into the pastoral charge of the Murray Harbor North and Peters Road congregation.

At the induction service held at 7.30 p. m. Rev. Thos. A. Rodger interim moderator of the session of Murray Harbor North and Peters Road, presided, narrated the steps leading up to the call, and later in the absence of the moderator of Presbytery Rev. Chas. J. St. Clair Jeans, inducted the newly called minister; Rev. Allister Murray offered prayer, Rev. R. Moorehead Legate read the Scripture lesson and preached the sermon; Rev. R. Hensley Stavert offered the dedicatory prayer, Rev. Thos. A. Rodger gave the charge to Rev. Mr. Currie and Rev. W. E. Davies addressed the people of the congregation.

A large congregation was present and the people are much pleased with the settlement after a vacancy of almost seven years.

Rev. W. E. Davies, interim moderator of the Montague Session presented to the Court a call addressed to Rev. Alex. Gibson, Bainsville, Ontario, from St. Andrew's Church Montague. The call was signed by 101 members and 39 adherents and was accompanied by a guarantee of \$1200.00 with the use of manse and glebe and four weeks holidays. Mr. Russell G. McLaren representative elder from Montague was heard in support of the call. Mr. McLaren told of the fine impression made by Mr. Gibson during his short stay in Montague. It was then moved, seconded and carried unanimously that the action of the interim moderator be approved of that this call be sustained as a regular gospel call and that it be forwarded by the clerk of the Prince Edward Island Presbytery to the clerk of the Hamilton Presbytery.

It was then agreed to ask Rev. Dr. Banks Nelson to present this call before the Hamilton Presbytery.

It was then moved by Rev. Allister Murray and seconded by Rev. W. E. Davies that the Presbytery ask the General Board of Missions, Toronto for a grant of \$800.00 to make up the salary of the minimum of \$1800.00. The motion was carried unanimously.

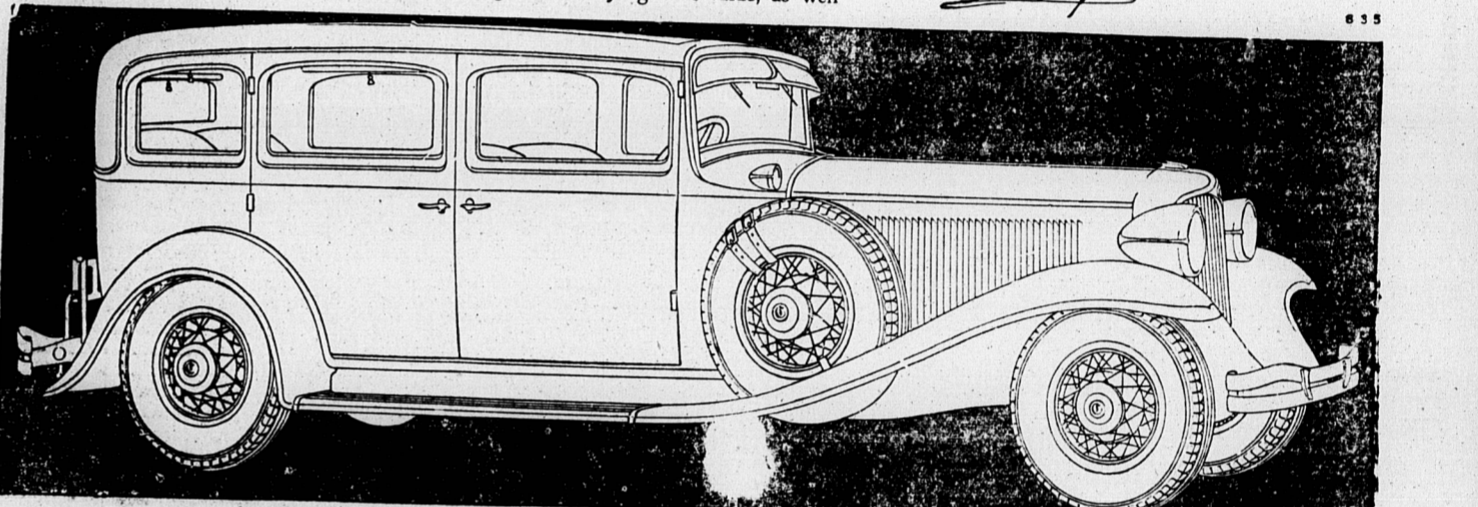
